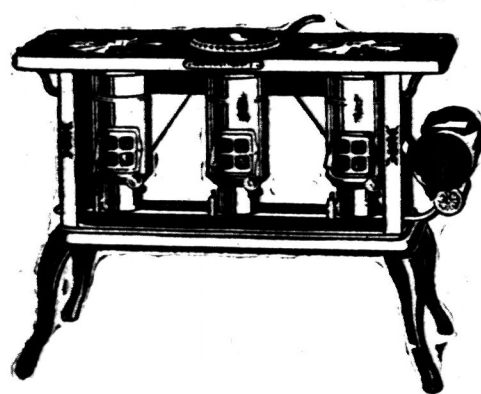

## PROBE DEATH OF SENECA TP. WOMAN

Taken Suddenly Ill Following  
Sunday Evening Meal.

An inquest has been ordered into the mysterious death of Mrs. Robert Gill of the third line of Seneca Township, who succumbed suddenly on Sunday night after her evening meal. The inquest will be held at the village of York on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mr. and Mrs. Gill were eating supper at the time, and both were in their usual health, when Mrs. Gill became suddenly ill, and was seized with severe vomiting spell. Mr. Gill was also rendered ill at the same time, and is still in a serious condition. Becoming alarmed at her mother's condition, the woman's daughter ran from the house and sought help. Mrs. Gill got up and went outside during the daughter's absence, and when the daughter returned she found her mother dead under a tree near the house.

The crown attorney has ordered Dr. Snider, of Cayuga, who is a coroner, to conduct the inquest on Thursday.

A post-mortem on the body of the late Mrs. Gill was conducted Tuesday, and the stomach has been forwarded to Toronto. There is talk of foul play, and the theory of ptomaine poisoning is also advanced.
