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Navy League Meeting
At the Music Hall on Saturday evening, Mr. Gordon Longman, of the Navy League, of Canada, gave a lecture telling of the great work accomplished by the League and accompanied his talk with one hundred interesting lantern views of the navy and merchant marine.
In his talk on the farm he pointed out that the farmer and sailor should work hand in hand, one producing and the other transporting our products. Only by reaching the best markets of the world can we hope for the best profits, and to do so Canada must have ships of her own register and manned by her own men.
The Navy League realize the necessity of having our Canadian ships manned by our native born sailors and with a view to awakening a sea consciousness in the youth of the land, Boys' Naval Brigades have been formed in several cities and towns and more will follow. The lads are provided with a fine healthy recreation and receive practical and theoretical instructions in seamanship. Another important phase of the Navy League is that of improving the condition under which the sailor lives while in port. This has been done by improving and building new institutes or homes in our Canadian ports.
The Navy League have also greatly assisted in the support of the disabled sailor of the merchant marine and the dependents of those who have lost their lives. There are some 4500 widows and orphans and 33000 disabled sailors to be cared for. These sailors were not considered as part of the active fighting forces and so no compensation or gratuities were given to them.
Canada's future prosperity depends much upon the individual efforts of her people and by supporting a policy which Builds and Binds a nation.

CUT HIS THROAT

Henry Hodgson, North Cayuga, Ends His Life.
Cayuga, June 25.—Henry Hodgson, about 40 years of age, living in the township of North Cayuga, committed suicide this morning about 9 o'clock by cutting his throat with a knife. He had been in ill health for about a year, and a brother died last Tuesday; these two causes, it is believed, preyed on his mind. He was intending going to a lawyer this morning to make his will, and got his cut out, but went into the house, and presently it was discovered that he had taken his life. He leaves a widow and two small children. Coroner Dr. Snider was notified, but concluded that an inquest was unnecessary.

FIRST DAY.
CAYUGA, June 17, 1920.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Warden in the chair.
The minutes of the last meeting were then read.
Smelser-Buckley—That the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read.
The following communications were then read:

1. Department of Public Works re plan showing route of Provincial high-way within the County.
2. Department of Education re Legislative grant for equipment and accommodation.
3. Letter from Union School Section No. 3, Walpole, and Rainham asking for grant for continuation school work.
4. McConnell & Hicklin advising that they have established themselves permanently in the county and are prepared to do contracting and engineering work.
5. Letter from Melvin Ranney claiming damages.
6. Petition of ratepayers of Dunn in reference to location of county roads.

Pyle-Hudspeh—That Messrs. Berry, McCarter and Buckley be a special committee to deal with communications, carried.
Hudspeh-Pyle—That the Dunn deputations regarding roads be referred to the Good Roads committee and that Mr. Ranney be asked to address them on the subject, carried.
Holland-Doyle—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet, carried.

SECOND DAY

CAYUGA, June 18, 1920.

All the members present.
Bradford Berry—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.
Berry-McCallum—That the equalized assessment for the County for the year 1920 be the same as applied in 1919 and that a bylaw be introduced for the purpose of equalizing the assessment of the county for the year 1920, and that the bill be read a first time. He was naturally a quiet, unassuming man with no craving for public office, but his business ability and personal qualities were such as to command the respect of all.
