Considering that he suffered a broken leg a few years ago, he is playing wonderful hockey. He's one of the most popular players in the Tiger camp."

### J. H. Salter Dead

In the passing of John H. Salter, who died at his home at 109 Chedoke avenue, Hamilton loses a most respected and useful citizen. Deceased, who was 68 years of age, has taken an active interest in the development of the city. He was secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Pressed Brick Co., and financially interested in many other industrial concerns in this part of Ontario, and was an active operator in local realty. Prior to his going to Hamilton he was a private banker in Hagersville where he started life as a telegraph operator, and later was an express agent at that and other points on the M. C. R. His wife, the daughter of J. Hager, after whom the town of Hagersville was named, is left to mourn his death. The remains were interred in the family burial grounds at Hagersville on Monday.

Mrs. Mary Forster, widow of the late Matthew Forster, passed away last Friday morning at her late residence, 295 Walnut street south, Hamilton, after a short illness.
