**Minutes of Special Meeting

All the members present, The Warden
in the chair.

Smelser-Holland—That we resume
business with the Warden in the chair.
Carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were
then read.

Smelser-Hoover—That the minutes of
the last meeting be adopted as read.
Carried.

The following communications were
then read:

1. J. L. Mitchener asking the Council
to supply him with a filing cabinet.

2. M. E. Crouch, Engineer, that he
expects to move to Haldimand County
April 1st.

3. County of Renfrew, resolution re-
bounty on wolves.

Pyle-Hudspeth—That Messrs. Bird,
Houser and Rancheby be a special com-
mittee to deal with the communications.
Carried.

Bradford-Berry—That this Council do
now adjourn to allow the different com-
mittees to meet. Carried.

Rancheby-McCallum—That we resume
business with the Warden in the chair.
Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the
County Council:

Gentlemen—We, your Good Roads
Committee beg to report as follows:

1. We met yesterday and opened ten-
ders from MacRae, Campaign & Cook,
Niagara Falls; E. G. Law, Toronto; and
McConnell & Hicklin, Toronto and Otta-
wa; for construction 2 1/2 miles of MacAdam
Road in this County, as per notice to con-
tractors, published in the Toronto Globe
and Contract Record and would recom-
mend (subject to approval of the Depart-
ment of Public Highways and any changes
they may suggest) that the tenders of
Messrs. McConnell & Hicklin be accepted
as follows:
- Road 1 and 16—From Village of Cayuga
to end of metal (near Town of Dunnville),
approximate distance 15 miles. Price per
mile \$12,900.
- Road No. 3—From 3rd line, Township
of Walpole, to Road No. 1, approximate
distance, 3 1/2 miles. Price per mile \$8,500.
- Road No. 5—From Road No. 7 to Road
No. 1, approximate distance, 4 miles.
Price per mile \$8,500.
2. Would recommend that we accept
the quotations from the Hagersville Con-
tracting Co., Ltd., to furnish stone to the
contractors and arrange for arrangements for
payments to be the same as last year and
settlement monthly.
3. The superintendent be instructed to
arrange for the operating of the Nelles
Contractors and Dennis quarries this coming
season, the machinery to be all looked over
carefully and repaired where necessary and
if any new machinery is required to be
obtained prices and submit to committee at
their meeting on March 13; also to ar-
range to have all road machinery repaired,
ready to begin operations as soon as con-
ditions in the spring will permit; also to
prepare a wage schedule covering all the
different kinds of work and submit to
committee at the next meeting.
4. Would recommend that H. A.
Hewitt, R. R. 2, York, be paid the sum
of \$50 for injuries received on road 18.
5. That the chairman of this commit-
tee and superintendent be authorized to
rent what trucks may be required for
hauling stone for constructing roads built
by the county outfalls and also the rental
of a ten ton roller for the season.
(Signed), W. G. Clark,
Chairman.

McCarter-Pyle—That the report of the
Good Roads Committee be adopted as
read. Carried.

Holland-Houser—That the report of
the Road and Bridge Committee be re-
ceived and read. Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the
County Council:

Committee have met and beg leave to
report as follows:

We would recommend that Mr. Stevens
examine the stringers (while the ice is on)
of the Lomas Creek Bridge and report at
next meeting.

Recommend payment also of the ac-
count of George Tyler for repairs to the
Caledonia bridge, \$4.95.

McCollum-Rancheby—That the report
of the Road and Bridge Committee be
adopted as read. Carried.

Clark-Smelter—That this council have
learned that it is proposed to form
judicial districts in pursuance of the Act
to amend the County Judges' Act, chap-
ter 26-9, George V. desire to place them-
selves on record that they are strongly
opposed to the county of Haldimand being
joint with any other county or counties
as they can see no benefit whatever to be
derived therefrom, and direct that a copy
of this resolution be forwarded to the
Attorney General. Carried.

Houser-Holland—That we recommend
that owing to the large amount of snow
and the likelihood of floods, etc., in the
spring, that each review of municipality
where county bridge is situated be autho-
rized to take such measures that they
deem necessary to safeguard the county
property. Carried.

Houser-Foster—That this council en-
dorse the action of the Warden and
Treasurer in taking up \$3,000 since our
last meeting. Carried.

Hudspeth-Pyle—That the account of
Mr. H. Hewitt recommended in the re-
port of the Good Roads committee be
added to the report of the Finance com-
mittee. Carried.

Hudspeth-Pyle—That the bylaw gov-
erning the members of the Municipal
Association be read a second time. Car-
ried.

Houser-Buckley—That the bylaw pro-
viding for the remuneration for members
attending the Municipal Association be
read a third time, signed, sealed and
entitled a bylaw as in the original motion,
carried.

McCarter-Bradford—That a bylaw be
introduced and read a first time author-
izing the Warden and Clerk to execute a
contract with the Canada Crushed Stone
Co., to pay for stone at the request of
McConnell & Hicklin used on the road to be
built by them. Carried.

Bercy-McCallum—That the bylaw au-
thorizing the Warden and clerk to exe-
cute a contract with the Canada Crushed
Stone Co. be read a second time. Carried.

Berry-Bradford—That the bylaw au-
thorizing the Warden and clerk to execute
a contract with the Canada Crushed Stone
Co. be read a third time, signed, sealed
and entitled a by-law as in the original
motion. Carried.

Smelser-Buckley—That a by-law be
introduced and read a first time for the
purpose of authorizing the Warden and
Clerk to execute a contract for building
roads with McConnell & Hicklin. Carried.

The bylaw was read a second and third
time, signed, sealed and entitled a bylaw
as in the original motion.

Houser-Buckley—That the Warden and
Treasurer be authorized to take up \$2000
from the Bank of Commerce. Carried.

Clark-Berry—That the county of Hald-
imand recommend that the life of the
county councillors be extended for a
longer term than one year so that the
good road movement be advanced, and
the clerk be authorized to forward a copy
of this resolution to the Good Roads
Association, Toronto. Carried.

McCarter-Berry—That we do now ad-
journ to meet Thursday, March 18th, at
10 a.m. Carried.
