French President Calls for Allegiance to Oath.

Says Germany is Still a Menace.

Paris Cable - President Deschanel calls on Great Britain, France and the United States to hold to their oaths of triple friendship, if surprises to which the Allies are exposed, as manifest in recent events in Germany, are not to result in loss of the fruits of victory and in danger to the peace of the world. This is his message, directed specially to the Englishspeaking peoples, given at a luncheon

to the press. In conversations with the correspendents after the address, President Deschanel denied that France has militaristic or Imperialistic endencies, declaring that she had simply prepared herself for defence against the German menace, which is pointing a revolver at her heart. democracies, he said, must more than ever remain united, in remembrance of the dangers of yesterd: y and in

precaution against the dangers of tomorrow. Maintenance of the Anglo-French-American understanding, he urged, is the prime and most solid guarantee of enduring peace. His appeal to Great Britain and the United States is regarded here as the most important pronouncement from the responsible head of an Allied Government since the attempt of the Prussian mil-

itarists to regain power. Like his illustrious predecessor, Poincare, President Deschanel does not disguise his distrust of the Germans, for which he has ample justification at this crisis in the world's history. His view is the one that pre-

vails throughout France. "Was the recent German upheaval," he asks, "a species camouflage for the restoration of Kaiserism? or, if there is real republicanism in Germany will it succeed in downing the militarists? And if it should succeed by means of counter-force, may we not expect Communism c Bolshevism next, thus presenting a new menace to the

world's democracies?" Whether the German disorders indicate camouflage or not, the French President is apprehensive of troubles ahead, owing to the pronounced check that German plans for readjustment have received. Opinions would seem to differ as to whether the possessor of the evil eye stition is very prevalent, it is believed that people whose eyes are of different color-the one, for instance, blue, and sica, and Sardinia, the owner of the evil eye is generally credited with eyebrows that are very marked, and which nearly neet over the nose. In the Balkans, Spain and some parts of Ireland the same eye is attributed to people whose eyes are obliquely set

and very pale. In the Western highlands the evil eye would seem to have most effect on animals, particularly cattle.



the morning The Hague, March 18.-The Dutch Government was taken severely to task for what was decided to be its leniency towards the former German Emperor in a debate in the Second Chamber of Parliament yesterday, when the Premier announced a decree limiting Count Hohenzollern's movements and his pledge not to mix

in politics. Deputy Schaper, Socialist, whose questions brought about announcement of the decree, said he was dissatisfied with the Premier's answer as a mere slight increase in the guards about the former Emperor was not enough, and Count Hohenzollern's pledge not sufficient. He said there were plenty of opportunities for the friends of the exile to bring him letters, and asked why visitors to the von Bentinck castle were not

searched. The Premier, in answer, referred to his letter to both Houses of Parliament, informing them of the assurance obtained from Count Hohenzol lern that he would refrain from all political activity and do nothing which would involve Holland in any international difficulty. He added that similar action with reference to the former Crown Prince had been considered.

Deputy von Ravensteyn, Communist, declared that the Government's policy of silence had strengthened the general belief that the former Emperor came to Holland' originally with Holland's silent approval. Count Hohenzollern, he said, had been permitted to live the quiet, easy life of a retired country gentleman, with a motor car at his disposal, in which he could cross the frontier any time he saw fit. The same also could be said, Deputy von Ravensteyn continued, about the former Crown Prince, who could maintain communication wit... he reactionary party in Germany. Other persons whom the Government considered undesirable were imprisoned and maltreated in concentration camps, even when provided with good

passports, the Deputy asserted. Other speakers took a similar stand, some wanting to know how long the Hohenzollerns would be allowed to stay in Holland. The Premier said the Government long ago stated it knew nothing in advance of the former Emperor's coming, and not a single person in the Government knew of it. Up to the present, the Premier declared, it has not appeared that the former Emperor or his son has participated in a single political ac-
