One of the oldest and most respected residents of Nanticoke passed away on Thursday, March 18, in the person of Mrs. Lucy Hind at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Frank Saunders.

Deceased was in her 71st year and had always enjoyed the best of health until about one month before her death. She was first married in 1873 to the late Albert Saunders and again in 1877 to the late Christian Hind, who predeceased her twenty-six years.
