W. C. T. U. Convention

For Norfolk and Haldimand Held at Caledonia.

The convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union for the Counties of Norfolk and Haldimand was held in Caledonia on May 6th. It was well attended and was a most enthusiastic convention. It was decided by those attending this convention put themselves on record as approving a "bone dry" Dominion of Canada, and pledged themselves to use every effort to further the success of the coming plebiscite vote.

They also advised the curtailing of the scope of the "movie," seeking thereby to take out completely the qualities of human nature too sacred to be put on a picture screen, and recommended a more careful use of "Movie bill boards," so as to eliminate the objectionable features.

They commented the use of the "movies" as an educational means, and would thus prevent their prostitution to purely financial means.

They regretted the public appearance of many women, even in the House of God, in scanty and unsuitable attire. The convention approved most heartily in scientific temperance instruction in our public schools; also that we urgently request our government to place suitable instructors in this subject in our teacher training schools.

The following resolutions were carried: Re Religious education in our schools.—We, the members of the Haldimand and Norfolk W. C. T. U., now in session would most heartily commend, and urge the teaching of the Bible in our public and high schools, and other institutions of learning, and would urge the churches of our land to unite on some common system or plan to be presented to the Educational Council, and incorporated in the curriculum of the aforesaid institutions.

Re Cigarettes—Resolved that we commend the three-fold efficiency test to protect the youth of our land by warning them against the evil effects of the cigarette habit upon mind and body, and we hereby wish to place on record our commendation of the action of such schools as have banished the use of the cigarettes, by any competing in school sports. We also would urge the circulation of anti-cigarette literature to combat this hurtful habit.

Re the Family Altar—Believing in the need of and blessing that follows the use of the family altar, we would express our entire sympathy with and co-operation in the forward movement of our churches, in the endeavor to conserve the family religion in the home by the establishment of the family altar.

CANADA'S BEST MILKERS

Were Bred at Riverside Farm, Seneca Township, Owned by J. W. Richardson, Esq.

The Holstein-Friesian cow, Johanna Jemima Posch, owned by Mr. W. C. Honck, Chippewa, Ont., has recently completed her year in the Record of Performance test with over 28,400 pounds of milk and 1,215 pounds of butter. She is due to freshen again in about thirteen months from the commencement of the test so will easily qualify under the fifteen months calving requirements. The butter record of Johanna Jemima Posch is the second largest ever made in Canada and is exceeded only by that of her dam, Jemima Johanna of Riverside, viz.: 1,280 pounds of butter from 30,373 pounds of milk.

It is doubtful if any dam and daughter in the world ever surpassed this pair in the production of milk and butter and it is certain that none ever equalled them in a test with such stringent calving requirements as the Record of Performance. In addition to being great producers, these cows are big, straight type animals, the dam weighing 2000 pounds and the daughter only a little less.

Unearth Mammoth East of Aylmer

ST. THOMAS, May 16.—An exhibit interesting to those versed in natural history, has been unearthed in the Stalter gully, east of Aylmer. The remains are those of a mammoth, with ribs four feet in length, and tusks over seven feet long. The framework would stand over 15 feet high. Mr. Charles White, who made the discovery, is sending the monster to the museum at Queen's University, Kingston.

Celebrations will be held at York and Oshweken on the 24th.
