WILFUL MURDER JURY'S FINDING

George Badley Sent to Fall Assizes on Murder Charge

CAYUGA May 20.—A jury impaneled by Dr. Quance, of Hagersville, coroner, in the case of Elizabeth Badley, of Rainham Township, killed on Monday by a blow over the head with a gas pipe, met at Selkirk at 2 o'clock this afternoon and returned a verdict declaring that she was the victim of wilful murder at the hands of her brother, George Badley.

Badley, who was taken from Cayuga to the inquest by Constable Lamb, was later brought before Magistrate James Hoover, of Selkirk, who committed him for trial on the charge of murder. The prisoner was lodged in the county jail here and will likely come up at the fall assizes. As there is but one turkey at Haldimand jail another man will probably have to be employed.

Until to-day it was believed that the tragedy occurred on Tuesday, but it is learned that the woman was killed on Monday, when she and her brother were alone, the father, Thomas Badley, being away on business. It is stated that the woman was decidedly weak mentally.

District Meeting

The annual session of Simcoe District meeting of the Methodist church was held in Jarvis Methodist church Friday, May 21st. All the ministers of the District were present and a strong delegation of laymen. Rev. D. A. Moir of Simcoe, chairman of the district presided. Rev. H. L. Smith was elected Journal Secretary and Rev. R. F. Mercer, of Nanticoke, Statistical Secretary. The financial returns showed a fairly successful year. \$7478 was contributed for missions, \$11,729 was paid as the first installment of the National Campaign. The total raised for all purposes was \$70,388.00 as against \$43,419.00 last year.

Rev. Henry Brand was elected to represent the District on the Stationing Committee at the Conference which meets in Woodstock June 3rd, 1920.

The ladies of the congregation served dinner in the church and merited the vote of thanks tendered to them by the visitors.
