The adjourned park meeting was held in the Temperance Hall on Monday evening. The committee submitted their report re grounds, but owing to one of the officers being so complicated the meeting had no power to deal with it. Another meeting will be held shortly.

On and after Nov. 1, all merchants are requested to carry a sufficient supply of stamps, and use them for the collection of luxury tax on articles sold by them. Penalties are provided for those who fail to observe the new regulations by trading without a license and without using the luxury tax stamp after Nov. 1.

Hagersville News:—Alex Hunter has leased the driving park grounds and race track from Henry Webb for a period of five years. Mr. Hunter intends putting the grounds in good shape for the holding of baseball games and other sports and will also improve the track which at present is considered to be one of the best half mile courses in Ontario.

Our agricultural artist, Gus Weil, the well-known stock buyer, threshed his season's crop of oats last week and they yielded well. The oats were gathered from a field of eight acres and Gus says when they are weighed up he will have nearer 700 bushels than 600. That's nearly half as many bushels as some farmers gather from a 100 acre farm.

Dr. Howell received a letter a few days ago from Chas. Moyses of Fort Hope, the owner of the pacer Bub, raised and developed and sold by the Dr. a little over a year ago. Mr. Moyses states that after a successful season last year he has started him thirteen times this season, winning ten races and was second in the other three starts. He also states that he has been offered \$1100 for him which he has refused, and says if the Dr. has another one for sale would like to buy him. Bub has apparently turned out to be a good pacer.

The funeral of the late John Harvey, who passed away at his home in Walpole on Saturday, Oct. 23rd, took place on Tuesday of last week to Hagersville cemetery. The deceased was 45 years of age and had been a resident of Walpole for several years and was well-known and highly respected. He had been in failing health for several months but had been around as usual until about a week previous to his death. At the time of his death he resided on the John Thompson farm, north west of this village. He leaves a widow and seven children.

Anderson, manager of the company, and there seems to be enough of it to give promise of commercial possibilities. A sample of the petroleum has been sent to Eugene Haanel, director of mines, Ottawa, for a report thereon.

U. F. O. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the County U. F. O. was attended by delegates from most clubs in the riding at Cayuga, on Tuesday afternoon of last week. The wet weather kept a few away.

The chief items of business were the receiving of the auditors' report and the election of officers for the ensuing year. Rev. J. V. Fradenburg and C. J. Smelser were re-elected president and first vice respectively. R. E. King withdrew as Sec'y-Treas., and E. J. Murray was elected to the position. The directors were also re-elected: J. W. Richardson, of Caledonia, for the U. F. O., and Mrs. J. F. Fradenburg for the U. F. W. O. Plans were laid for completing the organization for the Dominion election, when a U. F. O. candidate will be placed in the field.

Navy League Donations

Helmer Is Given 18 Months' Term

Justice Kelly Sentences Young Man for Manslaughter

Simcoe, Oct. 26.—"Eighteen months in an Ontario reformatory" was the sentence meted out to Lorne Helmer this afternoon by Justice Kelly for the killing of James A. Leary. The verdict of the jury was "guilty of manslaughter." In his remarks to the young man in passing sentence his lordship referred to his previous good character, his enlisting at an early age as circumstances in his favor. If he were to consult his own feelings, his lordship said he would have allowed him to go, as he was assured that the experience he had gone through would prevent him from committing further breaches of the law. The jury had also recommended mercy in this case.

In the interests of the public, however, and in the face of recent happenings the judge said he felt that the discharge of Helmer would not be wise. Since September 20 until the beginning of this week, west and north of Toronto, not less than 17 murder cases have come or will come up for trial. "An awful record for any section of the province," said Judge Kelly.

Helmer's young wife embraced her husband as he stepped out of the witness box to return to jail.

After the wedding luncheon Mr. and Mrs. Winlaw motored to Stratford, and from there will take a short honeymoon trip.
