Trouble Over Gas In Western Ontario

They seem to be having a merry time over the gas question up in Kent county. The Union Gas Company which is supplying that district on Monday shut off the supply to four towns against the order of the Ontario Government. The department of mines immediately ordered the supply resumed and authority to municipalities to have this done, even if force had to be used. The order was not carried out in all cases before the citizens took a hand and turned the gas on for themselves. At one place the pipe line was again cut and repaired a second time by consumers after an exciting chase of the men concerned. Citizens are now guarding the pipe lines and looking to the government to enforce the order. At Blenheim fifteen special constables were sworn in by Mayor Clinis to patrol the pipe lines. They are armed with revolvers and anyone detected of shutting off the supply of gas to Blenheim, as was done on Monday, will meet with a warm reception. The towns concerned are Tilbury, Ridgeway, Blenheim and Dresden, and the trouble has arisen over these places turning down by-laws for increased rates. Gas Commissioner Estlin, backed by the Government, has appointed deputies to turn on and maintain the gas to these towns. Gas companies consider a violation of property rights. Warm court fight is expected. Premier Drury hopes for amicable settlement.

LATER—Through the efforts of E. S. Estlin, provincial gas commissioner, an armistice has been declared, the gas service being resumed to the towns cut off until after a conference between Premier Drury and the Ontario Cabinet, the mayors of the various towns interested and the gas company, when the whole question of rates and a supply will be discussed in full.

The municipalities express a willingness to pay a somewhat higher rate, but not the 50c and 75c schedule asked by the Union Gas Company, and a compromise is likely.
