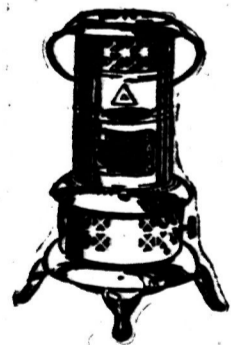

Death of David Kelly of Woodhouse.

David Kelly, a highly respected farmer of the Township of Woodhouse, died quite suddenly at his farm on Thursday last. In the latter part of the afternoon he had gone out with a bottle of milk to feed a sick lamb in the field and not returning in due time in the evening a search party of neighbors found him dead in the field near the flock of sheep. The sick lamb had been fed and he was on his way back apparently when death overtook him. He was 85 years of age, but in the last ten years, although quite active, he only did odd jobs about the farm as he may have liked. His grandson, Lawrence, has been in charge of the farming operations for some years and lived with his grandfather and grandmother. In the last year, however, the late Mr. Kelly could not exert himself very much without becoming exhausted. The Coroner, Dr. McGilvery, was called but he did not consider it necessary to hold an inquest as the cause of death was evident. Where he fell the sharp edge of a stone embedded in the ground protruded slightly and he received a severe injury at the bridge of the nose and the shock from this injury in his physical condition and advanced age was sufficient to cause death. The ram of the flock was about twenty feet away from the spot where the body was found, and although this ram is quite tame and playful at times, some are of the opinion that the ram may have bunted him, but there is no certainty. His medical advisor had told Mrs. Kelly that he would go suddenly and he could not expect to live much longer. The first reports of his death and the condition in which he was found were considerably exaggerated.

The deceased Mr. Kelly was a fine type of gentleman, fond of his neighbors, patient and kind at all times and always ready to assist. He was kind to the animals and stock upon the farm, enjoyed the work feeding and looking after them. He was a tanner by trade and for some years managed Doan's tannery at the Hollow.

There were six children in the family, three sons and three daughters, and the left surviving him, his widow (who is 87 years of age), two sons, David L. Kelly, Norfolk, Virginia; W. E. Kelly, K.C., Simcoe, and two daughters, Mrs. Anna Kelly Tyrrell, Principal LaSalette Separate School, and Madam Kelly, of the Sacred Heart Convent, Halifax, and several grand children and some great grandchildren.

He had three grandsons in military service in the late World War, one in the American army and two in the Canadian army. He was a Liberal in politics and supported the farmers' cause in the recent Provincial election. He was a native of Ireland, a loyal Canadian, and was 60 years in married life on October 1st of this year and lived in Doan's Hollow, upon the farm where he died.

The funeral which was attended by a large number of friends and sympathizers was held on Saturday last, and the procession of motor cars reached the Catholic Church, Simcoe, at 10 a.m. Rev. Father Nagle celebrated Requiem High Mass. Two small grandsons acted as acolytes during the Mass and another grandson (William E. Kelly) from St. Peter's Seminary, London, assisted in choir. Mrs. W. E. Kelly (daughter-in-law) organist. Several prominent Simcoe citizens were in attendance at the church, among whom may be mentioned, Hon. Senator McColl, Jonathan Porter, County Treasurer; Major A. A. Winter, Dr. McGilvery, Charles A. Austin (Ex-mayor), E. D. Holliday, Charles A. Terhune and many others.

The following citizens acted as bearers at the funeral: Hubert O'Mahoney, John R. Smith, John Maxwell, Charles Thompson, Ernest Cantelon and Albert Schoff. Lawrence D. Kelly (grandson) will continue the working of the farm. David E. Kelly, Barrister-at-law, of the firm of Kelly & Porter, Simcoe, and Leo J. Kelly, Assumption College, Sandwich, are grandsons.

Another Pompeii.
During the war archaeological excavations were continued at the Italian colony of Cyrenaca on the North African coast, and now comes the news that what has been found already promises the uncovering of another ancient city as important as Pompeii. Once upon a time the spot was a Greek colony, with the civilization of Greece transplanted to the soil of Africa. The work has been carried on during the war under the supervision of Prof. Lucio Mariani, director of the archaeological services of the Ministry of the Colonies, and the prediction is now made that the newly discovered city will eventually prove actually richer than Pompeii in its evidences of a past civilization. Here have been already found statues of the Graces, a Hermes, an Eros, an Alexander the Great, and most impressive of all, the Aphrodite of Cyrene, which is said by certain connoisseurs to be a fair rival in beauty to the Venus of Milo and the Venus of Callias. The discoveries have extended over many years.
