Curries Loses Leading Citizen

W. D. Smith, Postmaster, Blacksmith and Prominent Churchman, Succumbs to Brief Illness.

(Sentinel Review, Woodstock)

After a short illness extending only from Saturday, William D. Smith, one of the few remaining pioneer residents of East Oxford, died Tuesday evening at his home at Curries.

The late W. D. Smith was born at South Hill, Cornwall, England, over 75 years ago. He came to Canada at the age of seven with his father when the latter in 1852 sold his farm at Cornwall and emigrated with his family, taking up land in Ontario. His son, the late Mr. Smith, settled in Curries over 45 years ago and has ever since carried on a general blacksmithing and woodwork business there as well as being Postmaster for the whole period. He also conducted a small store and for many years was a dealer in coal and grain.

W. D. Smith was a man of sterling character, very widely known both in his own and the adjacent townships and greatly respected by all who knew him. He had been a mainstay of the Curries Methodist church, has served many terms on the school board and has throughout his long life been an example to all who came in contact with him; of a broad minded, public spirited and high principled man. He was in politics a Liberal, though never taking any active part in them.

Besides his widow, who was a daughter of the late George Starr, he leaves a family of five sons and two daughters, as follows: Rev. H. L. Smith, Jarvis; Mrs. Fred J. Watt, Curries; Dr. W. D. Smith, Creemore; Morley Smith, M.A., L.L.B., practicing law with the firm of Oslar, Hosken and Harcourt, Toronto; George L. Smith, in third year dentistry at Western University, Chicago; Miss Imogene Smith, nurse-in-training at Western Hospital, Toronto, and Master Bruce Smith, at home. There is also left Miss Sara Starr, a sister of Mrs. Smith, who has lived with the family for many years. Two brothers, Rev. A. E. Smith, B.A., B.D., of Toronto, and John B. Smith, of Carleton Place, survive him.

The passing of Mr. Smith is a deep loss to the community which he has served so faithfully for so many years. The funeral took place from Curries church to Friday afternoon, the pastor, Rev. Mr. Caldwell, and Rev. Jos. H. Wells, B.A., officiating.
