Changes in game laws—Partridge may be shot between the 5th and 20th of November only and no person shall take, kill or have in his possession more than five birds on one day, nor more than ten for the season. No muskrat shall be shot or speared at any time, nor shall any muskrat or beaver house or dam be cut, speared, broken or destroyed at any time. No trap must be set closer than five feet from a muskrat or beaver house. Another important change is that deer or moose cannot be shot or molested while in water.

The Dominion Natural Gas Co. has asked for an increased price for Gas and that a by-law be made by the Council on account of increased cost.

Holmes-Smith—That a by-law to authorize and empower the Dominion Natural Gas Co. to charge increased prices for the sale and distribution of Natural Gas within the village of Jarvis be introduced and read a first time. carried.

The by-law was read a second time and authorized to be advertised for three consecutive weeks in the local paper.

McNeill-Holmes—That a by-law be introduced and read a first time for the taking of a vote of the electors on a proposed by-law authorizing the Dominion Gas Co. to increase the price of Gas. carried.

The by-law was then read a second and third time, signed, sealed, numbered and entitled a by-law as in the original motion.

Howell-McNeill—That sufficient portion of the curb at the corner of Talbot and Main streets be removed and corners widened to allow of greater safety and comfort to the public at that section and if thought advisable to place a silent policeman at that intersection—carried.

Howell-McNeill—That this council adjourn to meet on the first Tuesday of November at the call of the Reeve.—carried.
