

Death of Thomas Johnston

ather of Mrs. A. G. Smith, of This Village.

Four weeks ago to day (Wednesday] Mr. Thomas Johnston, of Fenelon Falls, who was the popular lock-tender in the Cataract Village, left for Niagara Falls, Ont., where he intended living retired for the future with his daughter. A few evenings before his departure the Orange Order, of which he was a prominent member, presented him with an address and Past-Master's Jewel, as a slight token of the high esteem in which he was held by the brotherhood.

Mr. Johnston had been in failing health for the past nine months and at the time of his death he was on his way to visit his daughter, Mrs. Smith of Jarvis, in company with his son in-law, Mr. Roberts and others, and owing to a slight accident on the track, and his weakened condition, Mr. Jonston fell off the gasoline speeder. He was taken to the Welland hospital where everything was done for him. It was found he was not burt in any way, only shock, and being unable to stand the shock he passed peacefully away on Sunday evening at 7.30.

Deceased gentleman had proved himself a kindly neighbor, a good citizen and a loving father. In religion he was a Methdist, in politics a staunch Conservative.
