## Death of Thomas Johnston

Father of Mrs. A. G. Smith, of  
This Village.

(The Watchman-Warder, Lindsay.)

Four weeks ago to day (Wednesday)  
Mr. Thomas Johnston, of Fenelon Falls,  
who was the popular lock-tender in the  
Cataract Village, left for Niagara Falls,  
Ont., where he intended living retired  
for the future with his daughter. A few  
evenings before his departure the Orange  
Order, of which he was a prominent mem-  
ber, presented him with an address and  
Past-Master's Jewel, as a slight token of  
the high esteem in which he was held by  
the brotherhood.

Just four weeks later (Wednesday,  
Sept. 29th), he was laid to rest in Fenelon  
Falls cemetery, which goes to show the  
uncertainty of life.

Mr. Johnston was a retired Government  
employee and was under medical care.  
He was born in Manvers, in the county  
of Durham, in 1863, and has lived in  
Fenelon Falls for the past 48 years. In  
1873 he married Mary A. Swanton, who  
pre-deceased him seven years ago. There  
are left to mourn his loss three daughters:  
Mrs. S. H. Strong, Mrs. Herbert Roberts,  
of Niagara Falls, and Mrs. A. G. Smith  
of Jarvis, and a step-daughter, Mrs. Wm.  
Webster, Fenelon Falls, from whose home  
the funeral took place; also two brothers,  
George and Edward in the West, and one  
sister, Mrs. Weatherlit, Fenelon Falls.

Mr. Johnston had been in failing health  
for the past nine months and at the time  
of his death he was on his way to visit  
his daughter, Mrs. Smith of Jarvis, in  
company with his son-in-law, Mr. Roberts  
and others, and owing to a slight accident  
on the track, and his weakened condition,  
Mr. Johnston fell off the gasoline speeder.  
He was taken to the Welland hospital  
where everything was done for him.  
It was found he was not hurt in any way,  
only shook, and being unable to stand the  
shock he passed peacefully away on Sun-  
day evening at 7:30.

Deceased gentleman had proved himself  
a kindly neighbor, a good citizen and a  
loving father. In religion he was a Meth-  
odist, in politics a staunch Conservative.  
It was a terrible shock to the friends and  
relatives of the deceased gentleman and  
Fenelon Falls is in mourning to-day for  
one of its oldest and most esteemed  
citizens.

The late Thomas Johnston was widely  
known and highly respected, having spent  
the greater part of his life in Fenelon  
Falls. But it was among the members of  
the Loyal Orange Association where his  
worth was best known. He had filled all  
the offices in his primary lodge, been  
honored by the County Orange Lodge  
with the highest honor in their gift, that  
of County Master, and was also an officer  
of the Orange Grand Lodge of Eastern  
Ontario, and a member of the Royal  
Black Knights of Ireland.

The funeral took place in Fenelon Falls  
on Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 29th, un-  
der the auspices of L. O. L. No. 996, and  
the Loyal True Blue Lodge, and was one  
of the largest seen in recent years, up-  
wards of 200 Orangemen being present.  
Impressive services were held at the  
residence and grave, conducted by the  
Rev. C. W. Barrett, of the Methodist  
Church, assisted by the Rev. John Bed-  
ford, while the beautiful service of the  
Orange Order was conducted at the grave  
by Rev. Bro. C. D. Lord, Chaplin, and  
W. Bro. Geo. Simmons, W. M. L. O. L.  
996. The pall-bearers were as follows:  
W. Bro. Joseph Beatty, D.C.M., repre-  
senting the County Lodge; Wm. Cook,  
the District Lodge of Fenelon; Bros.  
Cochrane and Kelly, the Loyal True Blue  
Lodge; Wm. Warren and Jas. Jackson,  
the Black Knights of Ireland.

The floral tributes were lovely, among  
which were noticed wreaths from R.P.B.  
No. 262, Lindsay; the County Orange  
Lodge; L.O.L. 996, Fenelon Falls; the  
family, and the True Blue Lodge.

Many prominent Orangemen from a  
distance were present, also a large num-  
ber from the surrounding country.  
On returning to the lodge room a reso-  
lution of condolence was passed to the  
daughters of the deceased gentleman,  
while short eulogies were paid to his  
memory by many present, among whom  
were: W. Bro. Jos. Jackson (Cobocok),  
Jos. Brown, W. Warren, N. Kennedy  
(Lindsay), Bro. Cochrane, Rev. Lord,  
Chas. Brown, District Master (Fenelon  
Falls), E. W. Moore, on behalf of Lind-  
say Seaside Chapter, and others.

## Seed Grain Distribution

(Experimental Farms Note)

The annual free distribution of sam-  
ples of seed grain will be conducted as  
usual at the Central Experimental  
Farm, Ottawa, by the Dominion Cereal-  
ist.

The following kinds of seed grain will  
be sent out this season:

Spring wheat (in about 5 lb. samples):  
White oats (about 4 lb.), barley (about  
5 lb.), field peas (about 5 lb.), field beans  
(about 2 lb.), flax (about 2 lb.).

Only one sample can be sent to each  
applicant.

Applications must be on printed forms  
which may be obtained by writing to the  
Dominion Cerealists, Experimental  
Farm, Ottawa, any time after Sept. 1st.

As the stock of seed is limited, farm-  
ers are advised to apply early to avoid  
disappointment. Those who applied  
too late last season are particularly re-  
quested to send in their names at once.
