Haldimand Sets Pace

Haldimand County is undergoing a silent but rapid transformation. The residents therein, but more especially the visitors to and through the county, are keenly aware of the change.

The sum and substance of this quiet revolution is "new and better roads." Two years ago Haldimand had a scant 22 miles of hard-surfaced roads, scattered indiscriminately through the county. To-day 96 miles of permanent roadways intersect this territory, and many more are projected in the near future.

The local committee appointed to canvass the village in the interest of the Navy League met with good success and more than reached the objective set for the village. The receipts were as follows: Messrs. Wm. Parkinson and I. W. Holmes, \$41.00; A. Rodgers and J. A. Brown, \$25.00; C. S. McCarter and A. L. Smith, \$46.00; E. T. List of County Roads

Designated By the County Council To Be Taken Over as County Roads

SCHEDULE "A"

Referred to in By-law No. 683, here to attached.

Township of Walpole

Extension of Road No. 3—From south end of present road, No. 3, going south to Concession 1, Walpole; thence west one mile through the Village of Nanticoke, to the second road west of Nanticoke—2½ miles.

Extension of Road No. 5—From south end of present road, No. 5, going south to Lake Erie—3 miles.

Road No. 19—Known as Centre Side Road, from Lake Erie going north to Provincial Road, No. 5—10 miles.

Road No. 20—Known as the Twelfth Concession, Walpole (Mud Street), from Provincial Road, No. 5, going west to Norfolk County line—5 miles.

Road No. 21—Known as Springvale Side Road, from Provincial Road, No. 5, going north and westerly to the Seventeenth Concession, Walpole—6½ miles.

Road No. 22—From Provincial Road, No. 4, going west along Concession 7, Walpole, to Norfolk County line—¼ mile.

Township of Rainham

Road No. 23—From Rainham Centre, on Road No. 11, going north on Side Road to Indian line—3 miles.

Extension of Road No. 11—Known as Rainham Road, from Selkirk Village, going east to the Indian line, connecting with the present road, No. 11—8 miles.

Township of Oneida

Road No. 24—Known as the River Road, commencing at the Corporation line of the Village of Caledonia (on McKenzie Road), and going east to the River Road, ¼ of a mile; thence along the River Road in a southeasterly direction, parallel with the Grand River to York bridge—4½ miles.

Road No. 25—Known as the MacKenzie Road, from the Corporation line of the Village of Caledonia, going south along the MacKenzie Road to Road No. 9, Town Hall, Oneida—4¼ miles.

Road No. 26—Commencing at Road No. 7 (Indian line), and going in an easterly direction along the Indian Road to MacKenzie Road; thence going north along the MacKenzie Road to the Third Concession of Oneida—4 miles.

Township of Seneca

Road No. 27—Commencing at the Westwood County line, approximately ½ mile east of Blackheath, and going south along the Empire Side Road to the town line between Seneca and North Cayuga—5½ miles.

Road No. 28—Commencing at Brant County line and going east past Cornies; thence south along the side road ¾ of a mile; thence east, 2½ miles; thence north ¼ of a mile; thence in an easterly direction to the Stoney Creek Road, 4¼ miles—9¾ miles.

Township of North Cayuga

Road No. 23 (Continued)—Known as the Nelson Side Road, commencing at the Indian line and going north to Provincial Road, No. 4—4 miles.

Road No. 27 (Continued)—Commencing at the town line between Seneca and North Cayuga, and going south across three concessions, crossing Provincial Road, No. 4, and M. C. R. and G. T. Railways, a few rods apart—3½ miles.

Road No. 29—Known as the River Road, commencing at the Corporation of the Cayuga line, and going southeasterly along the River Road parallel with the Grand River—4 miles.

Township of South Cayuga

Road No. 30—Commencing at South Cayuga Town Hall (upper) going west 2 miles; thence north 1¼ miles to Meadow's Corner; again commencing at the Town Hall and going east 1½ miles; thence north ¾ of a mile—5½ miles.

Township of Canboro

Road No. 31—Known as the Moore Road, commencing at Trudel School House (on Talbot Road) and going south to the Robinson Road, connecting with Road No. 15—4 miles.

Road No. 32—Known as Smithville and Darling Roads, commencing at the Lincoln County line and going in a southerly direction to Provincial Road, No. 4, 2 miles; thence continuing to a southerly direction along the Darling Road 1 mile—3 miles.

Township of Dunn

Road No. 33—Known as the Marshall Side Road, commencing at Road No. 13, and going east to Port Maitland—2 miles.

Road No. 34—Commencing at Road No. 11, 1 mile west of Byng, and going south 2 miles—2 miles.

Road No. 35—Known as the River Road, commencing at Road No. 11 and going in a northerly direction along the River Road.

Township of Moulton

Road No. 36—Known as the Hutchinson Road, from Forks Road, Road No. 14, going south 2 miles—2 miles.

Road No. 37—Known as the Michigan Ditch Road, from Forks Road, Road No. 14, 2½ miles, going in a northerly direction to Moulton Station—2½ miles.

Road No. 38—Known as the Inman Road, from Forks Road, Road No. 14, going south 2 miles.

Road No. 39—Known as Diltz Road, commencing at the Corporation of Dunnville, and going in a northerly direction 2 miles.

The Provincial Government expects to be through with its highway building campaign for the year by the 10th of December, and cease building operations on that date.
