BY-LAW No. 59 OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF JARVIS

A By-law to authorize and empower The Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited, to charge increased prices for the sale and distribution of Natural Gas within the Village of Jarvis.

WHEREAS, by By-law Number 58 of the Village of Jarvis, passed on the 17th day of May, 1918, certain rights and privileges to sell and distribute natural gas for the purposes of heat, light and power within the said Village of Jarvis, were granted to the Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited, hereinafter referred to as the Company, for the period of twenty-five years from the date of the passing of the said By-law, as in the said By-law is more particularly set forth.

AND WHEREAS, in order to obtain an adequate supply of natural gas for continuing the sale and distribution thereof within the said Village of Jarvis it is necessary for the Company to incur a large expenditure in sinking additional natural gas wells within the County of Haldimand, and the Company have requested that power and authority be given to it by a By-law of the said Village of Jarvis authorizing the Company to charge increased prices for the natural gas hereafter supplied by the said Company within the said Village of Jarvis for the purposes aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to grant the request of the said Company subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth.

AND WHEREAS the granting of the right to the said Company to charge such increased prices upon the terms and conditions provided for and hereinafter set forth has been duly assented to by the Municipal electors of the Village of Jarvis, as provided for by the Municipal Act.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis, as follows:

1. For Natural Gas furnished and distributed by the Company for the purposes of heat, light and power and any other purpose within the said Village of Jarvis under the powers granted under the said By-law Number 58 aforesaid of the Village of Jarvis, from and after the coming into effect of this By-law the price shall be entitled to charge the price of forty-five cents per one thousand cubic feet, or a price equal to, but not to exceed, the prevailing rate from time to time hereafter by the Company charged domestic consumers in the County of Haldimand, whichever is the greater rate.

2. This By-law shall take effect after having received the assent of the electors, and after the Company shall have formally accepted the same by entering into an agreement in writing under seal with the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Jarvis upon the terms and to the effect and containing the conditions and provisions set forth in the agreement contained in Schedule "A" hereto, and the Reeve and Clerk of the Corporation of the said Village of Jarvis are hereby authorized and required to execute the same on behalf of the Corporation and to affix thereto its Corporate Seal upon the same being executed by the Company, within thirty days after the final passing hereof, and this By-law shall not come into effect until the Company shall have entered into such agreement in writing under seal with the Corporation.

3. That all existing agreements entered into between the said Company and the said Corporation, and the provisions of said By-law number 58 of the said Corporation, except as to the price of gas which the Company may charge as provided by this By-law, and except as otherwise provided by this By-law, shall be and continue in force and be binding for all purposes and to the same intent as if this By-law had not been enacted and passed.

4. The Company shall repay to the Corporation the costs, charges and expenses of the Solicitor of the Corporation and of incidental to the drawing and passing of this By-law and of obtaining the assent of the ratepayers thereto and of the agreement hereinafter provided for.

SCHEDULE "A" REFERRED TO IN THE BY-LAW HERETO ANNEXED

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made and entered into (in duplicate) this day of A.D. 1920.

BETWEEN: THE DOMINION NATURAL GAS COMPANY, LIMITED, a body corporate and politic organized under the laws of the Province of Ontario, hereinafter called the "Company,"

OF THE FIRST PART, AND THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF JARVIS, hereinafter called the "Corporation,"

OF THE SECOND PART.

WHEREAS the Council of the said Corporation on the day of 1920, passed a By-law granting to the Company certain rights and privileges with regard to the price payable for the production, sale and distribution of natural gas for the purposes of heat, light and power, and any other purpose within the limits of the said Vi-

lage of Jarvis, subject to the terms, conditions and stipulations, provisions and things therein contained, a copy of which said By-law is hereto annexed;

AND WHEREAS these presents are intended to give effect to said By-law; NOW THESE PRESENTS WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises and of the granting of the rights and privileges and franchises, which are by the said By-law granted by the Corporation to the Company, the Company for itself, its successors and assigns hereby covenants, promises and agrees to and with the Corporation, and the Corporation covenants, promises and agrees to and with the Company as follows, that is to say:

1. That the Company do hereby accept such By-law, and that the Company, its successors and assigns will perform, observe, fulfill and keep all and every the terms, conditions, agreements, stipulations, provisions and things in said By-law contained, which said rights and privileges are, by the said By-law granted to the Company, and will do and perform all sets, matters and things which the said By-law provides are to be done by or on behalf of the Company.

2. And the Corporation do hereby ratify and confirm the said By-law and the rights and privileges thereby granted to the Company, subject however, to all the terms, conditions, agreements, stipulations, obligations and conditions and things in the said By-law contained.

3. And the Corporation covenants with the Company, its successors and assigns that the Corporation will not repeal, alter or amend the said in part recited By-law or revoke the franchises and privileges thereby granted without the consent in writing of the Company, provided, and so long as the Company is not in default in observing, performing and keeping the covenants and conditions thereby and hereby covenanted on the part of the Company to be observed, performed and kept.

4. The said By-law and this agreement shall extend to and be binding upon the successors and assigns of the party hereto.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the Corporation have caused to be affixed the Corporate Seal and the Reeve and Village Clerk have set their hands, and the Company have caused to be affixed its Corporate Seal, and the Vice-President, and General Manager and Secretary have set their hands the day of the year above written.

BY-LAW NUMBER 59 OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF JARVIS

A By-law to provide for taking Votes of the Electors on a proposed By-law entitled "A By-law to authorize and empower The Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited, to charge increased prices for the sale and distribution of Natural Gas within the Village of Jarvis."

Passed the 7th day of October, A.D. 1920.

WHEREAS a proposed By-law of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis, entitled "A By-law to authorize and empower The Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited, to charge increased prices for the sale and distribution of Natural Gas within the Village of Jarvis," requires for its validity the assent of the Electors, and it is expedient and necessary to enable the Electors to vote on the proposed By-law.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis:

1. The votes of the Electors of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis shall be taken on the said proposed By-law on the 9th day of November, A.D. 1920, between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and five o'clock in the afternoon at the following places, and by the following Deputy Returning Officers, namely:

polling Place—Polling Sub-Division No. 1, Jarvis—Andrew Rodgers, Deputy Returning Officer.

2. On the 8th day of November, A.D. 1920, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, the head of the Council of the said Corporation, or some member of said Council appointed for that purpose by resolution, shall attend at the Council Chamber in the said Municipality for the purpose of appointing, and if requested so to do, shall appoint by writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the pro-

posed By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and opposing the proposed By-law.

3. On the 10th day of November, A.D. 1920, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon at the Council Chamber in said Municipality, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-law.

Cayuga Jail Statistics

According to Cayuga Jail statistics, recently compiled, the cost of rations for prisoners during the past year has been 21 cents per day. There have been 5 prisoners who could neither read nor write—four males and one female. The nationalities of the prisoners were as follows:

Canadian, 17 males and 2 females; English, 2 males; Irish, 2 males; Scotch, 1 female; American, 2 males; other countries, 6 males.

In religion they were divided as follows: 14 Catholics, 8 Anglicans, 6 Methodists, 1 Presbyterian, 2 other denominations.

Three were married and 26 were unmarried.

The trial of Lorne Helmer for the murder of James Learn, the aged farmer, whose body was found concealed on the Helmer farm in North Walsingham, began at 5 o'clock Tuesday at the assizes at Simcoe. The young man took his place in the box with a pallid face, but with composure, and answered the charge when read, with "Not guilty."

LIFE IS GIVE AND TAKE PROPOSITION

No Man, Under Modern Conditions, Can Live Entirely Unto Himself.

EACH DEPENDENT ON OTHERS

Citizen Who Does Not Aid in Building Up Community Can Not Expect to Have Prosperity Himself.

There was a time in the world when a man could do pretty much as he pleased. What one man did was of little concern to anyone else, for it had little effect on anyone else. Those days are gone, however, and they never will return. To-day, no man can live entirely unto himself. Life is a complicated affair under modern conditions. No one man in any community is entirely independent of all others in that community. Organized society, in the form of governments, national, state and local, have recognized the new conditions and have decreed that every man must observe certain rules in his relations with his fellow men. He must not do certain things that would endanger the health of other people in his community. He must not do such things as would disturb the peace and quiet of his neighborhood. He must remember that he owes a duty to his community.

Not Question of Right.

A man may say that he has the right to spend his money where he pleases; that no one can stop him if he wants to buy his groceries, his clothes and his furniture in some city miles away from where he earns the money to pay for them. He is right. There is no law to prevent him from doing so, unless it is the law of self-preservation. The man who has the right to send his money away to some distant city instead of spending it at home, also has the right to send his children to that city to be educated in the schools, which his money helps to support, but he doesn't exercise that right. He sends his children to the local schools, the maintenance of which is made possible by the men who spend their money at home.

Life in any community to-day is a

give-and-take proposition. A man can not take everything and give nothing and get away with it for any great length of time. He can not take his living from a community and give nothing back to help the other fellow make a living. If he cuts off the other fellow's living, he is bound eventually to cut off his own, for unless the other fellow has money to buy his labor or his goods he can not make a living himself.

You may say that what you buy doesn't amount to much and the money that you send away to the mail order houses in other cities can not have any great effect upon the general business conditions in your town. Maybe it doesn't amount to much and maybe it won't have any great effect upon the community's prosperity in itself, but what will be the result if every person in the community, or half of them, or a tenth of them, take the same view of the matter. Your business, in itself, may not amount to much, but taken together with the business of a hundred others in the community, it amounts to a great deal. It amounts to the difference between a prosperous community and a "dead" one. It amounts to the difference, in the end, between good times and bad times for yourself and your own family. If you lived on a desert island, it would make no difference where you sent your money, because it would make no difference whether you had any money at all or not. But you are not living on a desert island. You are living in a modern community. To do everything possible to build up that community is not only a duty which you owe to the community, but—more important still—it is a duty which you owe to yourself.

Taxes Will Increase.

You have children to educate. You want your community to have good schools so that your children may have the same advantages that the children in the big city have. If you over which to haul your products to market. You may say that you pay your share of the taxes out of which the school houses are built and the roads constructed. Maybe you do pay your share, in proportion to the value of your world's goods, but where is the other fellow to get the money to pay his share of the taxes if, after making your taxes, you send the remainder of your money to some other community to help build their schools and construct their roads. The merchants of any community pay a very considerable part of the taxes collected in that community. Go to the tax books and you will find this to be the case. When the business of the merchant falls off and he carries a labor on his back, he pays smaller taxes, and as the amount he pays in taxes decreases, the amount you pay must increase if the schools are to be maintained and the roads kept up. It may be a man's own business if he wants to send his money to help build up the big cities where the mail order houses flourish, but it's poor business for himself as well as for everybody else in the community in which he lives.
