

HANGMEN WANT MORE PAY.

History of This Sinister Calling In England.

An unusually weird topic came up for debate the other day in the British House of Commons, when the fees of hangmen were discussed by the honorable members. This occasion inspired a correspondent of the Manchester Guardian to send in the following contribution touching upon the history of that sinister trade: "Hangmen have always been regarded as dreadful persons in England, though not without a certain gruesome attraction, especially to curious people of more or less diseased imaginations. But they have requited this interest in different ways. Marwood, for instance, was a frequenter of the Green Dragon in Fleet Street after carrying out his duties at Newgate in the morning, and 'the retiring little man, dressed in the most funereal of clothes, clutching a pint pot with his long and nervous fingers, could sometimes be drawn out for a consideration by the young bloods who knew his favorite haunt and resorted thither.' Very different was the fate of those who tried to "draw" Calcraft when in retirement he visited the Peacock at Islington. It was his rule that no reference to the subject of his profession must be made in his hearing. He looked like 'an old alderman,' and his real identity was supposed to be a great secret; he even changed his name to Smithson, and delighted to discourse of the old coaching days and to recall the time when he himself was a mail guard. "James Berry, like his successor in

the post of hangmen, thought himself inadequately paid. In his autobiography Berry suggests that the Home Office should pay the hangman a fixed salary of £350 a year. He would have much preferred this to the fee of £10 for an execution. It would bring him a larger income, for he reckoned on an average of only twenty executions in a year, and, moreover, the hangman would be spared the distasteful task of perusing newspaper reports in the hope that a fellow creature may be condemned to death.' Berry points regretfully to the remuneration of his French confrere, M. Antoine Deibler -2560 a year, with a similar amount to divide among his four assistants. Sanson, the first executioner to manage a guillotine, was originally paid 21,520 a year, but when executioners were appointed in each department this was reduced to £800. Before the Revolution the legal tariff in France was 25s. for a beheading, 16s. 8d. for a burning at the stake, and the same amount for a hanging, with allowances for the erection of a scaffold or the provision of fuel."

Some Queer Journals.

Popular papers by no means constitute the bulk of periodical literature. Nearly every business and profession has its own particular "trade journal." For instance, laundry-workers have four to choose from, pawnbrokers two, professional conjurers at least three, and vets. quite a number. Even the bargee was not up till recently left uncatered for, there being the "Bargeman" to amuse him ever so often. And undertakers can wax more or less merry over the "Undertakers' Journal," while rag and bone collectors may watch their interests in the 'Waste Trades Journal." Caretakers have the "Caretaker" to enjoy.

Trade journalism does not stop at that. It looks after lesser-known businesses and hobbies, as witnessed in the existence of the "Ringing World," for bell-ringers, the "Bloodstock Breeders' Review," the "Racing Pigeon," the "British Beekeeper," "Talking Machine News," and the Flute Players' Journal."
