Increased railway freight and passenger rates went into effect throughout Canada on Monday. Freight rates have been increased 40 per cent, while the passenger rates have gone up 20 per cent.

Wm. McNeally, of Woodhouse, about two miles south of Varencey, met with considerable loss on Friday last when fire destroyed three stacks of grain, a hog house and a registered bull. The neighbors, assisted by part of the Port Dover fire department, saved the barn and other property from destruction. The cause of the fire is said to have been spontaneous combustion.

The total attendance at the Toronto Fair for the two weeks was 1,152,000, some 48,000 short of the record of 1919, when the turnstiles checked up 1,201,000. It is the third occasion in the history of the Exhibition when the million mark has been reached in the matter of attendance, the first occasion being in 1913, when the million was passed by a few thousand odd.

On Sunday afternoon Dorothy, the four-year-old daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Hare, got hold of a small bottle containing carbolic acid, which Mr. Hare had got out to bathe his horse's legs with, and had taken a taste of it, with the result that her mouth and lips were considerably burned with the acid. The little girl was attended by Dr. Jaques. Fortunately she had not swallowed any of the acid.

Anniversary services will be held in Chalmers' Church, Walpole, on Sunday, Sept. 26th, when the Rev. Wm. Blake of Cayuga will preach at 11 a.m. and 7.30 p.m. On the Monday evening following a grand concert will be given by the following high-class artists: Miss Olive Russel, reader, and Mr. Howard Russel, tenor, of Toronto, Miss Booker, violinist, Hamilton, and Miss Meta M. Murchy, accompanist. Admission 40c.

Last Friday evening Dr. and Mrs. Leatherdale met with an accident on a road south of here when their car struck a sheep on the road, the car plunging into the ditch. The sheep was killed, but the occupants of the car fortunately escaped without any serious injury, although Mrs. Leatherdale had her shoulder slightly injured. The steering apparatus of the car was also put out of commission.

The tingle of the fire bell on Monday evening about 8 o'clock caused considerable commotion for a time, and it seemed that everybody in town was on the street instantly. The alarm was sounded for the residence of Mr. G. Blumenstock, where a slight blaze was caused by the stop-cock of one of the jets upstairs which had become loose dropping out, and the escaping gas igniting. It had scorched the paper on the wall before the gas was turned off. The fire engine was on hand but she blaze had been extinguished before its arrival, and it is not known whether the engine would have worked had it been required as it undoubtedly must be pretty well dried out. This is just a little reminder of the inefficiency of our fire fighting apparatus. Has the town got sufficient fire protection?

Mr. Wm. Richards, who visited Jarvis last week after an absence of forty years, was much pleased with his visit to the village, and during his stay met many whom he knew. In an interview he stated that his father and mother and family came from England and settled in Jarvis about 43 years ago, and after residing here three years moved to Alliance, Ohio. While they lived here a two year old son of Thos. Richards was killed on the track near the overhead bridge, while the H.&P.D. road was being built between here and Port Dover, and was buried in the Methodist cemetery. Of the large family three daughters and three sons are still living, all of whom reside in Alliance, except William who has resided in Buffalo for the past year. He states that his father died about 30 years ago and his mother passed away about 8 years ago at the age of 95 years. He spoke of the many changes in the village since his time and of its improved appearance, and also spoke very highly of the treatment accorded him at the "Commercial" where he stopped while here.

County Council

Cayuga, Thursday, Sept. 9, 1920. Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Warden in the chair.

Doyle-Clark—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried. The minutes of the last meeting were then read.

Smelser-Buckley—That the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read, carried.

The following communications were then read:

1. Letter from Inspector of Public Charities re fire escapes at House of Refuge.

2. Letter from Director of War Trophies re war trophies for this county.

3. Letter from MacConnell & Hicklin re Cayuga bridge.

4. Letter from Chairman of Mother's Allowance Commission re appointment of local board.

Hudspeth-Pyle—That Messrs. Bird, Bradford and Foster be a special committee on communications, carried.

Clark-Smelter—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet, carried.

Bradford-Berry—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.

Foster-Bradford—That this Council endorse the action of the Warden Treasurer in taking up the sum of \$10,000.00 for construction account from the Bank of Commerce, carried.

Pyle-Hudspeth—That the report of the Special Committee on Communications be received and read, carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:
Gentlemen—We, your Special Committee on Communications, beg leave to report as follows:

1. Re fire escapes and hydrant communications; that be referred to committee of the whole.

2. Re MacConnell & Hicklin reinforcing Cayuga Bridge; be referred to the committee of the whole for discussion.

3. Re War Trophies; we recommend that each local municipality make application to the Committee on War Trophies, Ottawa.

4. Re Mothers' Pensions; we recommend that it be referred to committee of the whole.

1. The accounts presented by the Superintendent were carefully examined and would recommend them for payment.

2. Your committee made a careful inspection on the 7th inst., of all work done this season and are hopeful that by Nov. 1 the season's work will be completed.

3. That Messrs. MacConnell & Hicklin be given an advance of \$4,000.00 on contract, road 5, division 9.

4. That the Superintendent be authorized to gravel approximately 150 yards of road, commencing at the boundary line between road 17 and Village of Cayuga, and going north to overhead bridge over G. T. R. tracks.

5. That the Superintendent advise the resident Engineer of Provincial Highways within the County that we can furnish him with an outfit to do the necessary repairs on their roads, Nos. 4 and 5.

6. That the Superintendent be given permission to place the trucks and rollers for the balance of the season where he considers they will give the best service in finishing the season's work.
