

Impeding The Mail

The question was asked in a farm paper, has a mail carrier any more privileges than a farmer? The answer was no.

Let me quote one law which states any person or persons doing anything to impede the progress of the mail is liable, etc. How can you impede the mail? If a mail carrier (or courier) was driving up to a box and you drove in front of him and said get to the right of the road, would he have to do it ? no, but a farmer would have to do it. If a mail carrier broke his rig he can demand a rig from anyone; if they refuse they are impeding the mail. He can demand a horse, or demend a blacksmith to shoe his horse at once: he has got to do it or he is liable. But the mail carrier must pay a reasonable price for all fayors granted.
