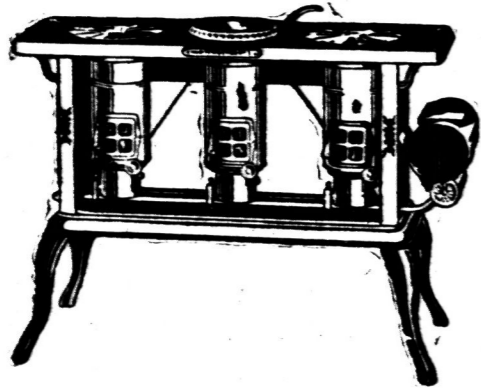

Impeding The Mail

The question was asked in a farm paper, has a mail carrier any more privileges than a farmer? The answer was no.

Let me quote one law which states any person or persons doing anything to impede the progress of the mail is liable, etc. How can you impede the mail? If a mail carrier (or courier) was driving up to a box and you drove in front of him and said get to the right of the road, would he have to do it? no, but a farmer would have to do it. If a mail carrier broke his rig he can demand a rig from anyone; if they refuse they are impeding the mail. He can demand a horse, or demand a blacksmith to shoe his horse at once; he has got to do it or he is liable. But the mail carrier must pay a reasonable price for all things granted.

Again, if a person leaves his horse in the post in front of the Post Office or leaves his automobile or bicycle when

not doing business in the office he is liable. Waiting for the mail to be sorted is not doing business. There are many other ways to impede the mail.

A MAIL COURIER

By-elections caused by the candidates assuming cabinet positions in the Federal Government of Hon. Arthur Meighen were held Monday in St. John and Albert counties, New Brunswick, and Colchester, Nova Scotia. Hon. E. W. Wigmore, Minister of Customs and Inland Revenue, was elected in the former over his Liberal opponent by 4,190, and Hon. F. B. McCurdy, Minister of Public Works, in the latter over his Farmer-Labor opponent by 1,750.
