SCHOOL FAIR ALSO HELD THE SAME DAYS.

Larger Attendance Than Usual

The annual fall fair of the Walpole Agricultural Society, also the School Fair, were held on the agricultural grounds here on Thursday and Friday last. The weather was ideal and on Friday there was a large attendance, the gate receipts being considerably larger than they have been for several years.

The exhibits were not as large as one would expect such a year as this when the crops were so good and fruit and produce so plentiful. Evidently the farmers were too busy to bring out their exhibits.

The School Fair was held in a large tent on the grounds and it was well filled with exhibits by the school children, and attracted considerable attention.

The Jarvis Band furnished excellent music during the afternoon in front of hall, which helped to enliven the occasion.

The races were as usual the centre of attraction, and both events were keenly contested. The 2.30 class had six entries, while the 2.10 class had three starters. Five-Year Sentence

Cayuga, Sept. 29.—Joseph Apert, of Dayton, Ohio, a "hot dog" vendor with a travelling circus, who at Dunville on the night of May 26, shot and killed Louis Thilman, the circus ticket seller, in an altercation over money, was today sentenced to five years in prison for his crime. The sentence is to date from the day of the shooting. Justice Kelly presided at the trial.

Apert was charged with murder, but the jury, after three hours' deliberation today brought in a verdict of manslaughter, with a strong recommendation for mercy.

Apert in the stand last night, testified that he had tired of circus life and wanted to quit. He said he had a dispute with Thilman over his money and the latter drew a gun. The prisoner admitted firing three times to protect himself.
