Five-Yéar Sentence

Cayuga, Sept. 29.—Joseph Apert, of Dayton, Ohlo, a "hot dog" vendor with a travelling circus, who at Dunnville on the night of May 26, shot and killed Louis Thilman, the circus ticket seller, in an altercation over money, was today sentenced to five years in prison for his crime. The sentence is to date from the day of the shooting. Justice Kelly presided at the trial.

Apert was charged with murder, but pleased with the condition of the track, the jury, after three hours' deliberation and one of them remarked that Jarvis to-day brought in a verdict of man-

Apert in the stand last night, testified that he had tired of circus life and wanted to quit. He said he had a dispute with Thilman over his money and the latter drew a gnn. The prisoner admitted firing three times to protect himself.
