## Silk Tree Orchard

Major J. H. Proctor, representing the Osgian Silk Co., completed a deal last Friday with Charles Culver for twenty acres of land, whereupon will be planted a model orchard of Osgian silk trees. A nursery will be established in this district within the next thirty days, and worms will be producing silk as soon as the trees bear leaves. This is the first district in Canada to start producing silk.—Sachem Reformer.

County Councillors Clark and Houser, County Road Superintendent McBurney, and County Solicitor Arrell are in Toronto to-day interviewing the Hon. F. C. Biggs in reference to County Roads. The County this year designated about 110 miles of County Roads in addition to the roads already taken over, and the Government have approved of only about 33 miles. The deputation will endeavor to have more mileage than 33 approved of.—Sachem.

## NEW CLASSIFICATION RATES

It Will Pay Users of Long Distance Telephones to Make a Careful Study of the New Plan.

The new data concerning the new classification of long distance which, according to the decision of the Board of Railway Commissioners came into effect April 21st, is interesting, and every user of the long distance wire ought to read it.

The principal changes in the long distance practice deal with what are called "person to person" calls, hitherto the calling party, who was willing to talk to "anyone" at the other end had to pay the same rate as the caller for whom a "particular person" had to be located and summoned to the phone. Now when you make a long distance call without specifying any particular person, the connection is established and conversation held, you have what is known as a "station-to-station" call and a lower rate will apply than when you ask to speak to a particular person. The word "station" means simply a telephone instrument. When you place a call specifying that you want to talk to a certain party, and a connection is established and you have your talk, you have made a "person-to-person" call. As the operating service performed and the circuit time used are greater than with a station-to-station call the rate is about 25 per cent greater.

Under this new method the user who is content to use the type of long distance requiring less operating labor and circuit time gets the benefit in the rate charged. Again when a "person-to-person" is made and the person desired is not in or will not talk, or when an exact telephone address of the person wanted is not given and he cannot be reached at a telephone within one hour a "report charge" applies. This charge is to make partial compensation for the operating work performed and the circuit time used, and is usually about 1/2 of the station-to-station rates.

There are also special rates for "appointment and messenger" calls; and for "evening and night" service on station-to-station basis.

## Charged With Stealing Liquor

John Wintermute, accused of complicity in the theft of eight cases of liquor from Thos. Hayes, a helpless cripple residing west of Springvale, was brought before Justice Slack on Saturday last and committed for trial. In company with two others he is alleged to have visited Hayes' home and to have stood guard over the latter while his companions removed the liquor to a waiting automobile, locking the door against their victim and pulling down the telephone connection. Wintermute was arrested at Windsor and brought back by officer Ince but the other suspected parties have so far eluded arrest. No trace of the stolen goods have been found. The case came up for a hearing before Judge Hopkins on Tuesday of this week. Sentence was reserved until the prisoner's record can be looked up in Detroit.—Hagersville News.

## Work to Commence Soon

Messrs. MacConnell & Hicklin are completing their organization for road building for 1921, and will start work as soon as the weather permits. They will commence road building from Cayuga, towards the east. They will also have under way the concrete structures between Cayuga and Jarvis and between Canboro and Welland county line. There will be eight or ten trucks at work. The trucks are under contract this year by Messrs. Frank Kett and John Booker, and Messrs. Ridout & Bethune, of Toronto.

## How Bees Have Wintered

From a statement made by R. F. Holtermann, we learn that the bees in Haldimand County, in fact, all over the Province, have wintered remarkably well. In fact, the winter on account of its mildness, has not killed any bees; any dead were either queenless or starved. There is abundance of clover, etc., and wheat probably never looked better in the province between Toronto and Detroit, and barring heavy frost after the early spring which often takes place under present circumstances, the prospect for a good honey crop is excellent.

James Patterson, Harry Miracé and Guy Vernon Emslay, the three boys charged with robbing the store of E. D. Holliday, Simcoe, on the night of March 27th, were sentenced by Magistrate Gurnett at Simcoe last week to one year in the Ontario Reformatory.

## The New Creamery

The canvass for shares for the new creamery to be erected in Jarvis is meeting with the hearty co-operation of the farmers in this district. Mr. C. P. Parkinson informs us that he has met with good success and that he is nearing the amount required. Anyone wishing to increase their share in this undertaking may do so by seeing Mr. Parkinson. Application for the charter will be made at an early date.

The doing away with the two factories located east and west of the village and the location of one creamery in Jarvis should be in the interests of not only their patrons' but all others in this neighborhood, owing to the decrease in the hauling and operating expenses. Every farmer should be more or less interested in this project, as it will afford a ready market for their milk and cream right at home.

## Robbery At Simcoe

Burglars entered the cellar of Harry Brook, Simcoe, early Monday morning and took several cases of "wet goods" from his vault. Mr. Brook was aroused in time to see them driving off in a car. The door had been forced by a crowbar. The cellars of H. H. Groff had also been entered. Both of these residences are a few blocks out of the corporation and are not under the surveillance of the police. Stephen Farrell and Fred Martin were apprehended in Brantford Tuesday night in connection with the theft, and were taken to Simcoe to come before the magistrate this morning.

## The Red Cross Membership Enrollment.

Interest in the Red Cross Membership Enrollment is rapidly growing and the indications are that practically every community in the Province will have a Membership Enrollment Campaign during the week beginning May 22nd. Most of the Local Branches already in existence have been quietly proceeding with the organization for Enrollment. The pamphlet, "The Crusade for Good Health" has aroused a tremendous amount of interest throughout the Province, and numerous applications for additional copies have been received.

In connection with the Dominion wide Crusade for Good Health undertaken by the Red Cross, Mrs. H. P. Plumtree, President of the Ontario Division, and Dr. Ruggles George, Director of Information on Public Health, Canadian Red Cross Society, addressed a very large and representative audience of citizens at Woodstock on Tuesday, April 19th, under the auspices of the Local Council of Women and the Local Branch of the Red Cross.

Mrs. Plumtree described the world-wide activities of the Red Cross in peace, and showed how the whole force of the movement could be brought to bear upon local needs.

Woodstock is one of the most progressive municipalities where people are alive to the value of Public Health, and an impressive appeal for support in a by law for the extension of hospital accommodation was made by Mr. John Bain.

Listowel, which already had 50 life members, has formed a branch, after an address given by Mr. A. M. Miller, Secretary of the Ontario Division and Dr. Ruggles George.

The following night in Stratford a branch was formed, the same speakers being present.

Great interest is being taken in the Health Films shown by Dr. Ruggles George at the various meetings. "Through Life's Windows" describes the care of the eyes, and the teeth have an attractive legend underneath the slides "A Mouth Full of Wisdom."
