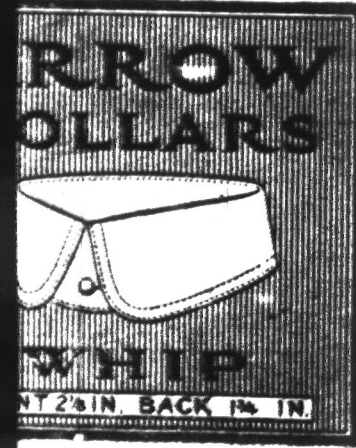

LIBERAL SWEEP

All Others.

Nova Scotia, Quebec and Prince
Edward Island Went Solid
For Liberals.

Voting throughout Canada yesterday
resulted in the defeat of the Govern-
ment. Right Hon. Arthur Meighen
himself was defeated by the follower of
Mr. Crossier, in his own constituency of
Portage la Prairie. Seven other min-
isters were defeated among them Hon.
F. B. McCurdy, Minister of Public
Works, and Hon. C. C. Ballentine, Min-
ister of Marine and Fisheries and of Naval
Service.
