### Selkirk

Selkirk Dec. 2.—The monthly meeting of the Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. M. Wadsworth on Thursday of this week. The ladies were busily engaged in making quilts for the Children's shelter, Cayuga. Twenty ladies were present and a dainty lunch was served.

Some of the fishermen along the lake are now taking in their nets, the heavy runs previously reported now being over.

J. W. Schwyer, of Nelles' Corners, is in Hamilton hospital, undergoing an X-Ray examination.

Dwight Miller, son of Alex. Miller, is spending a few days with his parents here. Mr. Miller is still feeling the results of burns sustained in a recent motor accident at Port Rowan.

Miss McKenzie, the popular teacher, of S.S. No. 2, Walpole, is reported sick.

Munroe Hoover, and family were in Beamsville this week attending the funeral of Mrs. Ida Jones. The deceased was the wife of Rev. M. F. Jones, at one time Disciple minister here.

Some very successful rabbit hunts have taken place here of late, different parties reporting from six to twelve rabbits for an afternoon's shoot. These prolific animals, if not curbed, will tend to become a serious menace to the farmers in these parts, who grow clover seed and wheat extensively.

### Federal Contests in Haldimand

In the five years, 1886-91 there were six Federal elections in the riding of Haldimand, which probably stands as a Canadian record. The first five were noteworthy as marking the struggle between C. W. Colter, Liberal and Dr. W. H. Montague, Conservative, which for tenacity and bitterness had not perhaps been equalled elsewhere in Canada. Colter, a young lawyer from St. John, N. B., represented the constituency in a by-election in 1886 and in the general election of 1891 he defeated Dr. Montague by a majority of one. A recount was demanded, the decision was given in favor of the Conservative. The Liberals, however were not ready to throw up their hands. They laid charges against Montague and his friends of wrong doing in connection with the election and following an investigation the doctor was unseated and a new election was ordered. This time Montague won out by 17 votes, but the Liberals again protested the election and after a famous fight through the courts which lasted more than a year the Conservative again lost the seat. It was in January, 1899, that the next by-election was held, and in this contest Colter was victorious by 46 votes. Charges of boodling and personation was again lodged this time by the Conservatives, and the battle in the courts renewed, resulting finally in Colter losing his seat. Colter met his Waterloo in the next by-election held on February 20, 1890, when Dr. Montague won the seat by 227 votes. Montague was re-elected in the general election of 1891 and 1896 and became a member of the Bowell and Tupper Cabinets in succession.

An interesting fact is the reappearance of Colter, now Judge Colter, in the political arena after a lapse of 31 years. He was the Liberal candidate in the present campaign in the riding of East Eglon.

Cayuga Advocate.—Wm. Walters is appearing before Magistrate Massey this Wednesday on a charge laid by game warden Wm. We understand that one coon skin and a number of traps were confiscated by the Game Warden at Mr. Walters'. Judgment was reserved, with the privilege of amending the charge.

## O. T. A CASES AT DUNNVILLE

### Three Convictions Reinstated and One Decision Reserved

Dunnville Gazette.—On Saturday last Colonel Massey, police magistrate, had a busy day, dealing with the charges of breach of the O.T.A., resulting from the visit of two spotters to Dunnville in October.

A conviction was recorded against Frank Brunt, and as this was a second offence, the magistrate had no alternative but to impose a penalty of six months in jail. The decision has been appealed.

In the charge against Frank Hyde the evidence was directly contradictory, and decision was reserved. In connection with this case there is a probability of a perjury charge being laid against one of the spotters.

The charge against Leslie Clark was undefended, and a fine of \$500 was imposed. Vernie Robins was also called on to pay a similar sum.
