Auto Market to be Larger

No delay in connection with the issu-
ing of the new motor licenses is antici-
pating this year. Chief Clerk J. Branch
of the Ontario Department of Public
Highways, stated that they ex-
pected to be ready to start the work of
issuing in full swing promptly on Janu-
ary 1st. The new license markers will
carry black numerals on a white back-
ground. The plates and general design
will be practically the same as this
year's, but the visibility of the numbers
is expected to be increased by the fact
that the figures will be four inches in
height instead of about three inches as
on this year's markers.

**Halt County Farmer
Gored to Death by Bull**

Oakville, Dec. 11.—Attacked on Sat-
urday morning by a bull while he was
standing beside it in the stall, William
Biggar, aged 60, a well-known farmer
residing on the 6th line, Trafalgar Town-
ship, Halt County, was gored to
death before assistance could be ren-
dered.

Biggar had been fixing the chain
which was used to tie the animal, when,
without warning, it pinned him against
the manger, the horn penetrating the
lung and ribs.

The late Mr. Biggar was a bachelor,
living and farming with his brother, A.
A. Biggar. He was well known through-
out the district, having been born on
the same farm where he lived all his
life. He was a member of the Ontario
Milk Producers' Association.

A few hours after his son was gored
by a bull Michael L. Biggar died with-
out learning of his son's death. He was
96 years of age. Father and son were
buried together Tuesday in St. Jude's
Cemetery.

The above deceased were an uncle
and cousin of Mr. Wellington Biggar of
Walpole.

Fire at Port Rowan

Simcoe, Ont., Dec. 9.—The village of
Port Rowan, which was badly damaged
a year ago by fire, was again visited
early this morning by a \$25,000 blaze,
which originated in the U.F.O. store.
The millinery rooms of Miss Pierce and
the Sterling Bank went with it.
A fire wall saved the furniture store
of C. M. Becker. The village has no
fire protection.

**COL. ATKINSON DIES
SUDDENLY AT SIMCOE**

Ex-Member for Norfolk, Former Com-
mander of 30th Regiment Suc-
cumb's Heart Trouble

Simcoe, Dec. 11.—Lieut. Col. T. R.
Atkinson, member for North Norfolk in
the Legislature during several terms and
former commander of the 30th Regiment
was found dead in bed at his home here
at 1 o'clock to-day. He had been living
alone and taking meals at the Battersby
House. His failure to appear to-day,
coupled with knowledge that he had been
suffering from heart trouble, prompted in-
vestigation. John Davis made an en-
trance to his home and found that he had
apparently retired as usual, and passed
away in his sleep.

The late Lieut.-Col. Atkinson was born
in Ancaster Township in 1855, and had
practiced law in this town for many years.
In recent years important dairy interests
in this county were under his personal
direction. He was a managing director of
the Norfolk Canning Company and a
director of the London & Western Trusts
Company, Limited. In 1895-96 he was
mayor of Simcoe. An unsuccessful candi-
date for the Commons in 1900 he was
elected to the Legislature in 1905, defeat-
ed in 1908, but successful in 1911 and
1914. He was a Liberal.

Direct Help for the Farmer

There are probably more people requir-
ing financial assistance this year than any
year for some time past. The banks are
doing their best to meet the requirements,
but the heavy demands upon them, make
it necessary to adhere as rigidly as possi-
bly to the short date loan.

A loan for a few months, is of little use
to the farmer in most cases. When they
borrow money for the purpose of buying
cattle, machinery, seed, fertilizer, in fact
nearly everything connected with the
farm, they require that part at least, of
the money needed to pay back this loan,
shall be earned by that which was pur-
chased with the money borrowed. This
takes in most cases in the neighborhood
of a year.

The Ontario Government at the last
Session, passed two Bills, which when
put into operation, should greatly assist
the farmers in financing their business.
Full information with regard to the sys-
tems by which financial assistance is
available to the farmers through the
Farm Loan Act may be obtained at the
Department of Agriculture, Cayuga. It
would appear that it is now up to the
farmer to help himself and we will sug-
gest that he get in touch with the De-
partment for detailed information on this
subject.

Compact Facts

Few people realize that 26,445 Cana-
dian ex service men have been estab-
lished on the land and are nearly all making
good: that Canada's water-power de-
velopment represents an investment of
\$475,000,000, while the power produced
would otherwise require 18,000,000 tons
of coal yearly; or that 88 per cent of the
world's supply of asbestos comes from the
Province of Quebec. The Natural Re-
sources Intelligence Branch of the De-
partment of the Interior, has just issued
a revised edition of "Compact Facts,"
which contains in concise form, infor-
mation regarding Canada; its area, popu-
lation, trade and industries; their extent,
capital invested, wages paid, values of
live stock, principal crops and amounts
produced; mineral resources and present
production; also forest resources and forest
products. Copies of the booklet are
available on application to the Superin-
tendent, Natural Resources Intelligence
Branch, Department of the Interior, Ot-
tawa.
