WATCH YOUR STEP

Nothing Lost by Keeping in Mind "Safety First."

Government Bulletin Lists Varieties of Accidents in Industries That Might Easily Be Avoided by the Exercise of Care.

Electric signs blink the slogan, "Be Careful," around the big mills. From mother's apron strings to the latest newspaper the voices of safety first call "Be Careful."

Now comes the United States labor department and tells how many ways you can get hurt by falling. There are three kinds of falling: (1) Falling from a high place to the level; (2) falling from the level into a place below level; (3) falling while walking or standing on the level.

In the first classification we find all kinds of high places to fall from. In the card indexes of the safety engineers they have records of people falling from benches, boxes, chairs, tables, bridges, dams and docks, cranes, elevators, derricks, hoists—elevated bins, pockets, tanks (falls from but not falls into)—buildings in construction or demolition—floors—ladders, scaffolds, staging—boilers, engines, machines—piles, poles, trees, roofs, runways, balconies, platforms, gangplanks, stairs and steps, tramways, trestles, windows, walls and wall openings.

Ladders, by the way, are the worst and trickiest of all. More falls from ladders than from any other high spots are recorded. As the safety engineers classify ladder falls: (1) You hit the ground because the ladder broke or a step in the ladder went to pieces under your foot; (2) either you slipped and twisted or the ladder slipped and twisted; (3) somebody or something knocked you off the ladder; (4) or how it all happened was a mystery.

Getting into Class B, where the fall is from the level into territory not on the level, people fall into excavations, pits, shafts, bins, vats, floor openings, man-holes. If standing or moving on the level you slip or stumble, you get into Class C. A stumble, however, may be caused by fixed objects or loose objects. A sleeping dog or a hunk of pig iron may trip up the feet that do not respectfully elevate.

The number of falling objects that knock people down and get their names into the accident records are collapsing buildings, walls, scaffolds, stagings, chutes, conveyors, slides, stacked, stored or piled-up material. Also racks, shelves, machines, work benches, temporary floors, trees, ditch and trench cave-ins, mine and quarry coal, rock and ore.

Experiences with "injuries due to scuffing, larking or horseplay" are noted in the federal labor department bulletin by Commissioner George Kingston of the workmen's compensation board of Ontario, Can. A railway porter wrenched his foot but was denied compensation because he "was larking with two young ladies" and showing them how fifty he was at jumping trains. Claims were allowed "where a Chinaman employed in a factory was the innocent victim of horseplay—blown up by hose; where a man had been teased by another workman suddenly turned in revenge and hit an innocent party; where a man about to punch the time clock was bit from behind by another workman, injured man innocent of any horseplay."

All of which gives us a hunch as to what the electric signs mean blinking late at night and early morning, "Be Careful."

How He Looked to Candid French Carticristes.

Leon Daudet is the "Gentleman with a Duster" of France—the indiscreet person who draws portraits of his fellow-statesmen and authors—unflattering but vivid and authoritative caricatures that look more like the man than the man does like himself. Such portraits M. Daudet has drawn in a book which he has just written called "Vers le Rot," which in a sense is the Parisian "Mirrors of Downing Street." Canadians are not likely to be much interested in these French pictures, but inasmuch as Aristide Briand is Prime Minister, it may be interesting to give the little picture of Briand that Daudet draws in this book of his, especially as a passage in its offers a new, interesting exercise in translation. The translator confesses that he himself has been rather more interested in the French of this passage than he is in the matter; and in order that the reader may go along with him the translator will present the original before he undertakes to translate it. It is as follows:

"Briand n'a rien lu, est ignorant comme une carpe, et paresseux comme une loche. Mais il connaît cette marche des pions sur l'échiquier, cet assemblage de trocs et de mines, et de travaux d'approche, de d'approche, de mines et de contre-mines qui, l'éloquence aidant, aboutissent nécessairement à un porte-feuille. C'est une bete specie, qui a une tete de fourbe et de ruse, un trone de tribun, des pattes pour couloirs, une poche a fiel et a venin et une remarquable facilité de torsion, rotation, et contre-torsion."

Now for the translation, and may the god of translators, be he Hermes, or Argus, or whoever he is—aid in the task:

"Briand has read nothing; he is as ignorant as a carp and as lazy as a loach. But he is past master of that sort of management of the pawns on the chessboard, that grace of trucking and tricking, that art of enemy, into a cabinet portfolio. He is a peculiar kind of animal with a fox's head and a demagogue's body, paws made for creeping in lobbies, a gall-bladder for all venoms and animosities, and a remarkable facility for twists, back-twists, and counter-twists."

This is not a literal translation, but a literal translation would be nonsense. Perhaps you do not know what a loach is. The translator did not until he had first ascertained that "loche" in French is "loach" in English, and that a loach is a kind of fish. What kind of fish it is, or why it should be supposed to be lazy, the translator does not know. Presumably the loach goes with the carp. "Ignorant as a carp" is good; it goes well with Irvin Cobb's "no more pricy than a goldfish," and "lazy as a loach" is even more picturesque than "paresseux comme une loche," being alliterative.

The impression that one gets of M. Briand is not altogether favorable, but neither is it particularly repellent. A successful politician must needs be a rather queer animal. Mr. Briand's portraits do not give one an impression of a Napoleon, a Wellington, a Washington, or a Harding. There is a strong flavor of Montmartre, not to say of the Boveries, in his physiognomy. But one fancies that he is a good fellow and a clever ruler for all that. The chances are that he will be popular when he gets to Washington.—The "Listener" in the Boston Transcript.

Secret of "Adam's Apple."

When our forefathers read the Bible they were fond of pursuing the stories and incidents contained therein ever farther than the Scriptural explanations.

Where the Book of Genesis, for example, merely relates the episode of Eve and the apple in the bryce and most concise language, legends go much farther—connecting various kinds of animals and birds with the Fall of Man and introducing scores of trimmings which do not appear in the original version.

One of these legends is responsible for the name "Adam's apple," as applied to the thyroid cartilage of the larynx, a projection which usually is much more apparent in men than in women.

This legend states that Adam, when he attempted to swallow his bite of the apple from the Tree of Life, choked, and the fruit stuck in his throat. All males since Adam have had this protuberance as silent evidence of the indiscretion of their ancestor.

War Casualties.

Final statistics relating to war casualties, demobilization, reuniting, and military tribunals since the outbreak of war are contained in an army bluebook just published. Between August 4, 1914, and September 30, 1919, 116,781 British officers and 2,354,371 other ranks were returned as casualties. From the commencement of the war to September 30, 1919, a total of 287,049 men were tried by courts-martial. Of these 256,784 were convicted, and 21,735 acquitted. Only 335 culprits were sentenced to death. There were 7,338 sentences of penal servitude, including 140 for life.—The Bits.
