Canals

A suggestion made by a Londoner that the bed of the Forth and Clyde canal should be converted into a highway of traffic has not been received north of the Tweed with the indignation that might have been expected. The Glasgow Herald says the notion is not so extravagant as it might appear. The swift progress of motor transport threatens the railways, and it can scarcely fail to affect the position of the canals in industrial and commercial economy. The canal belongs to those leisurely periods of the world's history which saw Egypt and China at their apogee. It was, it is interesting to remember, in the fifteenth century, a time of development if ever there was, that canal engineering received its great impetus in the Western world owing to the discovery of the "lock" system. England applied the new idea with such thoroughness that her canal system became second, probably, only to that of Holland.

Accident Policy's Limit

If a man die of blood poisoning as the result of giving himself a hypodermic injection, his family can collect nothing on his accident insurance policy. For the possession of a hypodermic needle is a violation of the New York public health law, Article 11A; therefore the man commits a crime and dies as the result. This was decided by the appellate division in a recent case.

John McClary Dead

John McClary, president and founder of the McClary Manufacturing Company, and one of the oldest and most respected business men of Western Ontario, died at his home in London early on Sunday morning.

Oh, Yes, It's a Snap

"Yes," remarked the town merchant, "I certainly have a snap. The wholesale houses draw on me every month, and draw on me at sight, but if I send a bill to a customer he gets swearing mad and quits trading at my store. While I'm hard up for money many of those who are owing me are sending their money to mail order houses. If I contribute money for any cause the people say I am bidding for trade. If I don't they say I am a hog. I am expected to dip up every day for everything that comes along, from a raffle ticket to a church fund, by people who claim they do part of their trading here, but our friends Robert Simpson and T. Eaton neither buy raffle tickets nor help the church fund, and they get the cash in advance business. If I sell a pair of trousers I must treat the family to candy or cigars, and if I buy a load of potatoes I have to do the same. Customers who are able to pay hang on to their money, while I pay ten per cent. at the bank to get ready cash. I have a big business during hard times and poor crops, from the people who are willing to trade with me provided I can duplicate catalogue prices and wait until harvest for my money. My scales weigh too much when I weigh sugar, and not enough when I weigh butter. I am a thief, liar and grafter. If I smile I am a soft soapy, and this certainly is a snap." And he looked over \$10,000 worth of accounts, all good, and wondered how he could raise \$300 to pay a sight draft now due.
