SHORT COURSE AT BRANTFORD
Haldimand Well Represented

The Short Course on Swine held at Brantford last week proved a great success, and much credit is due to the Canadian Packing Plant for their hearty co-operation. No effort was spared by them to make the course as pleasant and instructive as possible. There was no lack of material demonstration, both in live hogs and dressed carcasses, and it was the general remark that the course was the best of its kind ever held in the province.

The idea of such a course originated with the Canadian Swine Breeders' Association, who were largely instrumental in its success. The Ontario Department of Agriculture gave valuable assistance in supplying lecturers, while the prize money for the competitions was donated by the Industrial and Development Council of the Canadian Meat Packers' Association.

There were nine boys present from each of the counties of Haldimand, Welland, Norfolk, Wentworth and Brant. The afternoon of the first day was spent in lectures on the bacon industry, past and future, a demonstration on Wiltshire sides, and a talk on judging live hogs. On the morning of the second day a trip was made through the company's plant, followed by a judging competition on live hogs. The afternoon was spent in lectures and demonstrations on swine carcasses. In the evening a banquet was tendered to the boys, by the Packing Company, which was well attended and enjoyed by all. On the last morning of the course a judging competition was held on dressed carcasses, being the same classes as judged on foot the previous day.

The envied prize of a pure-bred Yorkshire sow was won by Ernest Stevenson of Welland, who proved himself a good judge and worthy of first honors. Mr. Frank Laidlaw, of Jarvis, won the distinction of standing second in judging live hogs, but unfortunately was unable to be present on the last day of the course. Other young men from this county who figured in the prize money were Lloyd Hoover, Selkirk; James Murray, Caledonia; Lyall Lindsay, Caledonia, and James Carter, of Hagersville. All the boys present did credit to themselves and the county they represented, and it is to be hoped that a similar course will be held next year.—C. Frey, Agricultural Representative.
