**Col. R. L. Nelles Dead**

Toronto, Dec. 27.—Lieut. Col. Robert Nelles, for nearly 40 years in the service of the G. T. R. and for 20 years connected with the 37th Haldimand Rifles, died suddenly at his home here this evening. Col. Nelles was apparently in his usual health and was sitting in a chair when death came. Born in Seneca, Haldimand County, in 1842, Col. Nelles, had lived until March 7 of next year, would have attained his 80th year. As a youth he joined the Haldimand Rifles, rose to the command of the regiment and was throughout his life keenly interested in the affairs of the militia. He saw service on the occasion of the historic Trent "affair" and in repelling the Fenian Raiders. The earlier years of his association with the G. T. R. were spent at Brantford and Caledonia and subsequently he was for 23 years the company's local freight agent in Toronto, retiring in 1910. Col. Nelles had three sons. One, Lieut. Harry Nelles, lost his life in the South African war. The other two are: James Franklin, Pontypool, and Rev. Bertram Nelles, of this city. His wife died a few months ago. Interment at Caledonia on Friday. Service in the Presbyterian church on arrival of morning train.
