TREASURE CAVE

J. A. Cryster, Cayuga, Believes He Has One On Farm.

An ancient cave, believed to have been used as a meeting place by one of the older tribes of Indians, has been discovered on the farm of J. A. Cryster at Cayuga. While excavating on his property recently Mr. Cryster found the opening and made some interesting discoveries on the inside. As that section of the province was at one time inhabited by the Cayuga Indians, and in view of the fact that the Cayuga's round house was located not far distant from the Cryster property, the present owner is inclined to the belief that the cave may have been used by the redskins as a treasure house or secret meeting place. Mr. Cryster, whose farm is adjacent to the Grand River, not far from Cayuga, is anxious to get in touch with someone who has a thorough knowledge of the Indians and who might assist him in making a thorough exploration of the cave.

Legal Marriage Age To Be Raised to 21

It is likely that during the present session of the Ontario Legislature the Government will introduce legislation making the legal marriage age for males 21, instead of 18 years, as at present. The bill will also provide that the issuing of marriage licenses shall be exclusively in the hands of municipal clerks.

A number of cases of measles are reported in town.

The loss by fire in Canada during 1920 amounted to \$27,371,574, and shows an increase of \$4,000,000 compared with the figures for 1919. The figures are exceeded by the loss during 1918, when the exceptionally high figure of \$31,915,844 was reached. The loss by fire during December amounted to \$3,896,476 and exceeded any other month during the year.

Holmes-Pond—That the assessor collect for each dog tag from the owner of the dog or dogs, assessed together with the statutory tax and that the corporate seal be attached to this resolution giving it the force and effect of a By-law.—carried.

Holmes-McNeill—That this Municipal Council, of the Village of Jarvis, do hereby humbly petition the Grand Trunk Railway to change the time of arrival of the Hamilton and St. Thomas evening train, which at present is due to arrive here at 8.50 p.m. back to the time as formerly, when said train was due here at 7.30 p.m., so that the citizens will be able to get their evening mail.—carried.

The Reeve presented a cheque from Wm. Hodges for pool license for one table to June 29, 1921.

Pond-Shaver—That we do now adjourn till the first Tuesday in March at 8 p.m. or at the call of the Reeve.—carried.

Satisfactory Report

Walpole Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company Had Good Year

The Annual General meeting of the Policyholders of the Walpole Farmers' Fire Insurance Company was held on Saturday last in the Music Hall, Jarvis. The attendance was not as large as usual, but the statement of affairs of the company for the year ending Dec 31st, 1920, was very satisfactory.

The Company shows a net gain in amount of insurance in force over 1919, of over \$175,000, and a cash balance on hand of \$9,786.65, or a net gain for the year of nearly \$1500.

The three retiring Directors were re-elected, and James McKenzie was returned as the Company Auditor for 1921.

At a subsequent meeting of the Board Directors, J. B. McKenzie was elected President and John Mitchell Vice-President.

James Williamson was re-elected as Directors' Auditor, and G. L. Miller re-elected as Secretary-Treasurer.

The President and Secretary were appointed to attend the Mutual Fire Underwriters' Association meeting in Toronto on the 22nd and 23rd of February.

Narrow Escape

Waterford Star—Wallace Burch, of Oakland, a student of Terrace Hill School, had a narrow escape from instant death on the M. C. R. tracks on Monday morning. Along with some companions he was walking down from the L. E. & N. An engine came along letting off considerable steam and as he stepped on the other track an engine moving slowly to the coal dock knocked him down. He laid between the two rails while the engine passed over him and escaped serious injury. His knees and back were bruised and he had a cut on the head which was sewed up by Dr. Gould. He was somewhat dazed when he got up, but soon recovered and was able to go home on the next car.

Haldimand Battalion

A meeting of the Officers of the 37th and 114th Battalions was held in Caledonia on Thursday, Jan. 27, for the purpose of re-organizing the Haldimand Battalion. Lieut. Col. H. J. Gould has received word from military headquarters that he has been chosen to command the re-organized force. A large number of former officers were present, but there was very little business to transact except to arrange for the re-organization. A list of officers was submitted to headquarters for approval.

Capt. John Verth, to be second in command of Battalion; Captain J. C. Martindale, Adjutant; Capt. R. H. Davey, Quartermaster; Wm. Robbie, Paymaster; Lieut. Grant Campbell, Signalling Officer. The M. O. is an appointment which has to be made by the O.C., C.A.M.C.

The Battalion is to be a four-company Battalion with headquarters at Caledonia.

"A" Company at Dunnville, Captain J. P. Melrose in command.

"B" Company at Caledonia, Capt. Wm. P. Lyon in command.

"C" Company at Hagersville, Captain A. J. Hoshal in command.

"D" Company at Oshweken, Captain Johnson in command.

The full complement of officers will be announced later.

To Reforest Waste Land

John L. Buck, C. S. Mitchener and Dr. H. Hawley were appointed a reforestation committee, with instructions to get options on waste land and report at the next session of the Norfolk County Council, which will be held before spring. It is the desire of the Council, if waste land can be had, to set out a considerable acreage of trees this year, but in no case will land be optioned which is suitable for other purposes.
