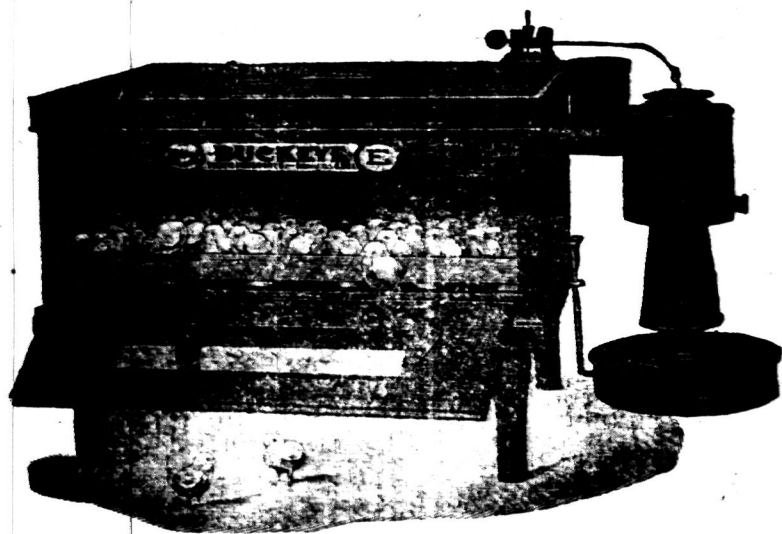

INCOME TAX RETURNS

Must Be Made Not Later Than March 31.

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—It is expected by the Commissioner of Taxation that all the income forms for the year 1920 will be available for distribution within two weeks at the offices of the Inspectors of Taxation for the various districts throughout Canada. Although these forms are to be distributed, the Income Tax branch wants it to be distinctly understood that the onus of obtaining the forms on which to file returns of the income earned or received during 1920 still rests in each case with the taxpayer and that non-receipt of a form will not be any excuse for not paying the tax at the proper time.
