Surveyors are at work surveying through here on the Stage Road which has been taken over as a Provincial highway. We understand the grading will be done during the coming summer.
Last Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock Messrs. C. Martin and D. E. Aiken of Simcoe, waited on the Hon. Mr. Biggs, Minister of Public Works, in regard to the County Good Roads between Simcoe and Jarvis. While very sympathetic the Minister stated nothing could be done until 1922.

County Police Magistrate Hunt has just closed the busiest year in his Magisterial career, according to his annual statement. Fines to the amount of \$6,735 were collected during 1920, as against \$1,067 in 1919. Two hundred and thirty-seven cases were tried last year and 143 convictions registered. In 1912 a total of 122 cases were tried and 66 registered. The Squire convicted 35 offenders of the Ontario Temperance Act last year and 88 violators of the Motor Vehicle Act—Aylmer Express.

The by-election in West Peterboro took place on Monday. G. N. Gordon, the Liberal candidate, was elected to the Commons in a five-cornered race by a majority of about 1200 over the Government candidate. The Farmer candidate was third.

A movement is on foot in Port Dover to erect a public skating arena, by forming a joint stock company. Why should Jarvis lag behind the neighboring towns when the same thing could be done here. A good rink here, aside from the pleasure it would afford, ought to be a paying investment.

The engagement is announced of Margaret Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Smith, Jarvis, to Rev. Phillip Duncan, B.A., St. James' Church, Dunphn, Man., son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Duncan, Aberdeenshire, Scotland. The marriage will take place at Carberry, Man., the latter part of the month.

W. A. McLean, Deputy Minister of Highways, has stated that the Department would be sending out notices as soon as possible to municipal authorities, informing them that the law with respect to headlights on motor vehicles is in effect and should be enforced. The law provides that every car operating on the public highways must have an approved form of headlight device.

Early this year there will be appointed 235 census commissioners, one for each Federal constituency. These in turn will appoint 13,000 enumerators necessary to find out how many people of all sexes, colors, ages, nationalities and creeds live in the Dominion. The whole thing will cost \$1,700,000, and the census taking begins in June.

On Monday night Andy Smith's big Red car was stolen from Mr. Heaming's garage and was found next morning near Mr. Inson's, on the Plank Road, north of the village. For some reason the thieves abandoned the car on the side of the road, but before leaving it they punctured the gas tank and removed the gas for their own car. They also stole the robes and did considerable damage to the Red. The perpetrators are being sought.

There will be four eclipses in 1921, including the annual eclipse of the sun, April 8th, invisible here, and a total eclipse of the sun Oct. 1st, also invisible in this part of the world. A total eclipse of the moon, visible in North and South America, New Zealand and part of Australia, will occur April 21st and 22nd, and there will be a partial eclipse of the moon Oct. 16th, the ending of which will be visible here.

Norfolk Tobacco Growers Form Association.

The tobacco growers of Norfolk County have recently formed an association, and are circulating a petition, which will be tendered to the Prime Minister, asking that the duty on imported tobacco be raised to \$1.00 per pound for unstemmed and \$2.00 for stemmed. The present duty on tobacco imported from the United States into Canada is 40 cents per pound, while the duty on Canadian-grown tobacco of a quality which is equal to that of the United States, is \$3.50 per pound. The petition will be brought before the House at the present session.

The Stratford Herald says: "In four years the cost of the white news print paper has increased three and a half times. Added to the already burdensome cost of producing newspapers, the postage rate on papers was increased on Jan. 1st by 200 per cent.

W. J. Bailey, the local coal and lumber merchant, has just received a car of nut coal which he is selling off the car at \$16.75 per ton.

Erie Telephone Meeting

The sixteenth annual meeting of the shareholders of the Erie Telephone Co. Limited, which was held in the Town Hall, Selkirk, on Jan. 27, 1921, was well attended and the proceedings were very quiet. S. W. Winger, president at the meeting, and M. F. Derby, one of the Auditors, read the auditors' report.

The retiring Board of Directors, Messrs. S. W. Winger and Dr. S. H. Quance, Hagersville; S. H. Sternaman, Cayuga; J. A. Burwash, Jarvis; Chas. Reichheld, Fisherville; and A. E. Hooper, and E. G. Hoover of Selkirk were elected by acclamation. R. E. King, Decesville, was re-elected as shareholders' auditor.

The standing of the company was very gratifying to the shareholders, and a dividend of 7 per cent was declared by the Board and is to be payable on July 1st, 1921.

The President called the attention of the shareholders to the fact that a number of dividend cheques are at the Head Office, and have been returned by the Post Office authorities for correct address, and some that have not been mailed out for want of the proper address to send them to.

Gives His Blood to Save Patient

London, Ont., Feb. 6.—Ten medical students in training at Western University responded yesterday to an appeal to yield a quantity of blood to save the life of a patient in Victoria Hospital. All were subjected to blood tests at the Institute of Public Health, and three were selected as of suitable type for the operation. The lot fell to Dr. Lewis, who is serving as an interne at the hospital, and a pint of his blood was transfused, under the supervision of Dr. Rankin. The patient, Mr. E. Kilmaster, of West Dover, is reported to-day to be in fair condition.
