## County Council

Smelser-Clark—That A. E. Havill and C. J. Martindale be Auditors to audit the accounts of the County, also the accounts of the House of Refuge for 1920, and the Clerk prepare a bill and bill be read a first time. Carried.

### SECOND DAY

Wednesday, Jan. 26, 1921.

The report of the Home Committee was adopted as follows:

There are no changes in the number of inmates in the Home since last report. The several accounts as handed to the Clerk have been o.k'd by Mr. Pyle and Mr. Holland, the committee of last year, and they report that everything is very satisfactory.

We hereby recommend that the several accounts be referred to the Finance Committee for payment.

Clark-Houser—That the Warden and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of the Province of Ontario, the petition of the corporation of the County of Haldimand, showing that during the period, January 1, 1920, to Dec. 31, 1920 there has been expended upon the County Highway system the sum of \$256,421.49 and requesting the statutory grants on that amount as provided by the Act to aid in the improvement of public highways. Carried.

A by-law was passed for the purpose of borrowing \$50,000.00 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce for current expenditure.

The report of the Building Committee was adopted as follows:

1. We instruct the chairman to advertise for tenders for rental of county flats, tenders to be in the hands of chairman before next meeting of the Council.

2. That a small stove be procured for the Clerk's room.

3. That a flag be bought for the Court House and the flagstaff be repaired.

The report of the Supply Committee was adopted as follows:

We have decided to advertise for the tenders for the Gaol supplies in Cayuga paper and for the House of Refuge supplies in the Dunnville papers, tenders to be in by Tuesday, the 15th day of February, 1921.

On February 15th the Home Committee and the Supply committee will meet jointly at the House of Refuge for the purpose of opening tenders and awarding contracts.

Berry-Smelter—That the County Council of Haldimand, now assembled desire to place on record an expression of its deep regret at the death of Mr. Daniel Dile, a former member of this Council. The late Mr. Dile was a man of exemplary character and moral worth and will be greatly missed. That a copy of this resolution be sent to his sorrowing wife and family as an evidence of our sympathy with them in their bereavement. Carried.

Wilton-Yocum—That the following resolution be passed:

1. That all rural mail contracts be cancelled and that all the rural mail contractors now employed by the government be immediately placed on a straight yearly permanent salary basis at the rate of \$70.00 per mile per year, and that this new rate now asked for be retroactive and take effect from the 1st of January, in the year 1917, and for the years 1917, 1918, 1919 and 1920, this increased rate now asked for be paid and that it become a permanent rate of payment in the future.

2. That the rural mail contractors be given all the statutory holidays, eight in number each year, with full salary payment.

3. That the rural mail contractors be paid every thirty days right up to date, within a week of the time it is earned, carried.

## Former Citizen Held Up

The following account of MORG HEWSON's recent hold-up is taken from a Montreal paper:

One of the nerviest hold ups reported in a long time took place last night on crowded St. Catharine street at a store on that thoroughfare between 7.30 and 7.45.

At the point of a revolver the owner of the establishment and his driver were held up by one gunman while the second robber rifled the cash register of \$60 and decamped from the place unmolested and undetected by passers by.

F. M. Hewson, of the firm of Hewson Brothers, wine merchants, 867 St. Catharine street west, and one of his drivers were the victims. Mr. Hewson was engaged in the rear of the store at the time and the driver was in the front and was not molested at first. Mr. Hewson in going to the store proper heard the telephone ring and answered the call.

While he was at the 'phone, the driver had been ordered to retrace his steps to the rear, the man who told him to beat it leveling a revolver at his head to enforce immediate obedience. The driver started and having no weapon, allowed himself to be driven back to the office, the whole affair being unnoticed by Mr. Hewson who was still at the 'phone taking an order from a customer.

When the 'phone call had been attended to, Mr. Hewson turned to face his prospective customer and he met the same revolver which had compelled the driver to retreat to the office.

"Hands up," had not to be repeated to Mr. Hewson who obeyed and obeyed the second command to walk to the office. Covered with the revolver which had never been lowered, the driver and the proprietor, unable to prevent it, saw the second man go to the cash register and take out \$60. The proprietor took too much interest in the proceedings to satisfy the gunman who cried out "Get back there or I'll nip you."

The hold-up duo walked to the door and were aided in their exploits by lowered curtains which hid the encounter from passers by. Detectives and police were on the scene shortly afterwards but no trace of the gunman could be found. The proprietor was told that the best protection he could get was that which came with the possession of a revolver and he was advised to procure one and shoot when attacked if he had a chance at all.
