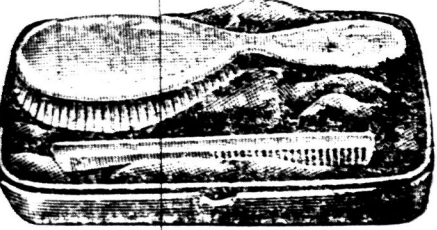

## ARE COMING OUT THE CIVIL SERVICE

BY END OF JUNE, 550 AGED MEN AND WOMEN WILL HAVE BEEN RETIRED.

It is estimated that by the end of June, 550 men and women will have been retired from the Civil Service of Canada. Since the passing of the Civil Service Act last session of Parliament, 1,639 civil servants over 65 years have been reported by Government departments to the civil service commission. Of these, 660 were recommended for retirement, it being considered the others could continue to render efficient service.

Many of those who have or are to be superannuated are over 70 years of age. One of the oldest is Adam Brown, postmaster of Hamilton, who leaves the service at the age of 94. Several women coming under the measure are in their seventies, and one, who has been in the service for 45 years, is 81 years of age.
