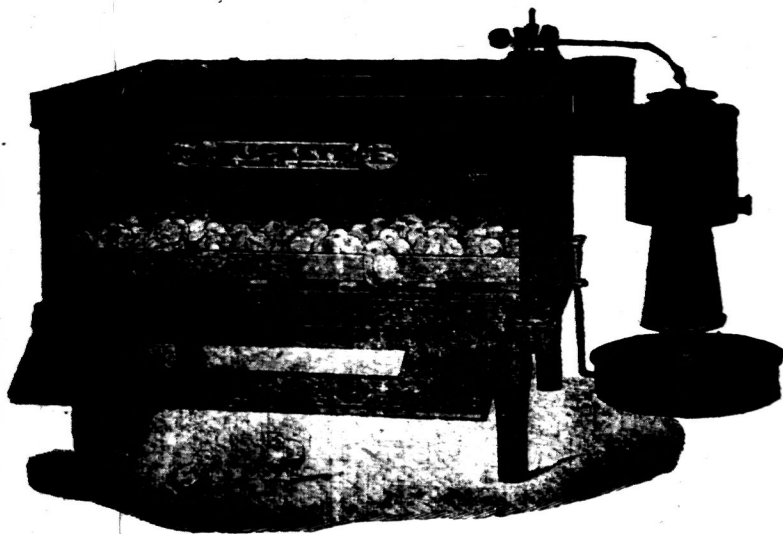

Oxford Holstein Cow Has Established Record

Ingersoll, Jan. 30.—Walburn Rivers, a prominent Holstein breeder of West Oxford is the owner of a cow, "Calamity Snow Pontiac," which has established a record for milk production. During the 365 days of the test year she gave 28,442 pounds of milk, with a butter production of 1,240 pounds. During 1919, when the first yearly test of this animal was made, she gave 25,338 pounds of milk with a butter production of 1,069 pounds. This is an average of 28,000

pounds of milk yearly for two years in succession, with a butter production of 1,180 pounds per year. This is a Canadian record for two years in succession which has not been beaten.
