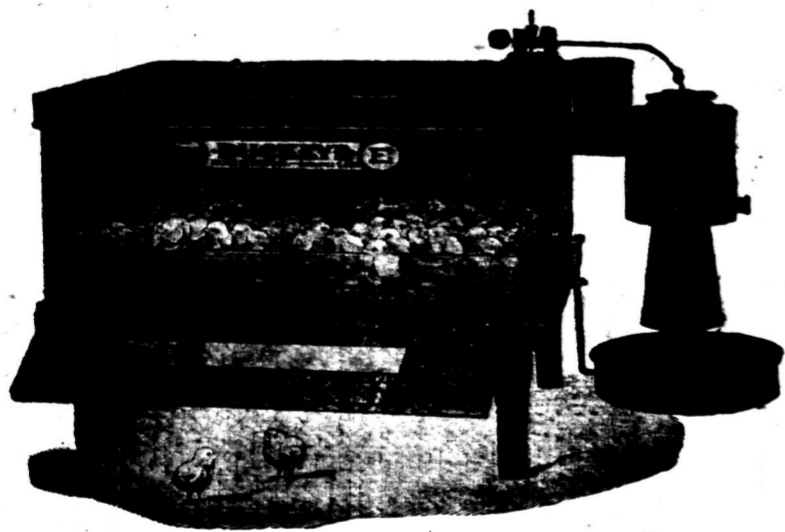

Grimsby Old Boys and Girls

Manufacturers and merchants who use the parcel post mail to a large extent have gotten into trouble over the use of glued paper for sealing parcels in place of string. The use of such seal, the post office holds, converts the parcel post mail into sealed mail, which should go first class as it is impossible to open the parcel and reseal it as called for by the regulations. All parcels mailed under parcel post must be so fastened that the fastenings can be removed to allow inspection by the post office staff.

At the assizes for Haldimand, Mr. Justice Masten presiding, two civil non-injury cases were entered, but one, Morrison vs. Harrison, an action to set aside a deed, was settled out of court.
