The Forty-second Annual Meeting of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union will be held at the Agricultural College, Guelph, Ontario, on the 11th and 12th of January, 1921. A cordial invitation is extended to every one interested in agriculture.

The programme is of special interest this year and includes discussions on Seed Growing Centres, Seed Cleaning, Plants, Sweet Clover as a Farm Crop, the Future of the Dairy Industry, Results of Experiments in feeding Live Stock, Beautifying the Country Homestead, etc.

The co-operative experimental work is in charge of eight distinct committees, four of which will report at this annual meeting.
