## BUSH FRUITS AND THEIR **CULTIVATION IN CANADA**

(Continued from last week). Herbert (a chance seedling. Probably a seedling of Clark).—Orig. 1887. R. B. Whyte, Ottawa, Ont. Introd. 1920, Renfrew Nursery Co., Renfrew, Ont. Fruit large to very large, obtusely conical, bright to rather deep red; moderately firm; juicy, sweet and subacid, sprightly and of good flavor; quality very good. Season begins a few days before Cuthbert. The Herbert has all the good points required in a variety for local market, being hardy, vigorous, productive, with fruit of large size, good color and very good quality. It is, however, not quite firm enough for distant shipment, hence its value as a commercial berry is limited to nearby markets. This variety has done very well from the Atlantic to the Pacific in Canada and succeeds well also as far north as the Peace River district. Jumbo.—Fruit large, conic, deep

crimson; firm, mildly subacid, lacking in flavor; quality medium. Midseason. A good shipper, and if hardy and productive will be promising new commercial sort. June (Loudon x Marlboro).-Orig.

Experimental Station, Geneva, N. Y., 1897. Introd. 1909. Fruit above medium to large, roundish, bright red; firm; moderately juicy, mildly subacid; quality medium. Season early. Plant vigorous and moderately productive at Ottawa. Not as desirable as early variety as Brighton or Count. A good shipper.

King.-Introduced by the Cleveland Nursery Co., Rio Vista, Va., in 1892. Fruit medium to above medium in size, round, bright red; moderately firm; moderately juicy, briskly sub-acid; quality medium. Season early. Usually a fairly strong grower but makes its best growth on the heavier soils. The King on account of its earliness has proved very profitable in some places. It is hardier also than some other varieties.

quality is, however, inferior. Leham (Minnesota No. 4 ling of King x Loudon).—Orig. Minn. Experimental Sub-station, Excelsior, Minn. Fruit large roundish conical, bright crimson moderately firm: juicy, briskly subacid, springhtly, aromatic, quality good. Midseason. Plant vigorous. Mid-Plant vigorous and pro-Has proved hardy and one of the most productive at Ottawa, but is too soft for shipment, and is not quite good enough in quality for home

Loudon.-Orig. Frank W. Loudon. Introd. 1894, C. A. Janesville, Wis. Green, Rochester, N. Y. Fruit medium to large, conical, bright red: firm; moderately juicy, subacid. sprightly, and of good flavor; quality Season medium. A medium to weak grower but a very hardy Not productive enough.

Mariboro (Highland Hardy x "Globe x Hudson River'). Orig. A. J. Caywood, Marlboro, N. Y. Introd. 1884. Fruit above medium size, roundish or slightly conical, bright red; firm; moderately juicy; quality medium. Season early. A moderately strong grower and usually productive, but is very subject to anthracnose. Was for a long time the standard early sort. Brighton and Count are as early or earlier and are better crop-

Miller.—Orig. At Wilmington, Fruit medium size, roundish, bright to dark red; drupes large; firm; moderately juicy, brisk subacid; quality above medium. Plant only moderately vigorous. Is thought well of in some places in the Prairie Provinces, but has not proved productive at Ottawa, and has been

rather tender. Minnetonka (possible parents Turner, Cuthbert and Wild Raspberry) .-Orig. about 1890 F. J. Empenger, Maple Hain, Minn. Fruit medium size, bright red; moderately firm: juicy; quality good. Season medium' early. A strong grower, very hardy productive. Useful in the Profrie Provinces because of its

great hardiness. Muriel (seedling of Biggar's seedling).-Orig. Wm. Saunders, London, Ont. Fruit medium to above medium in size, roundish to slightly conical. bright to deep red: moderately firm: juicy, subacid; quality above medium. Season early. Plant vigor-This has proved a productive variety and is deserving of wider

test. Newman (Newman No. 23) (Eaton x King?).—Orig. C. P. Newman, town of Lasalle, P. Q. Not yet introduced though thoroughly tested at Dominion Experimental Stations. Fruit large, roundish, bright red; firm; moderately juicy, flavor good, subacid to sweet, sprightly; quality good. Season medium. Plant very vigorous, productive and hardy. This is a handsome fruit and should be an excellent shipping berry and has proved one of the best for canning.

Newman No. 24 (Eaton x Baumforth?).-Orig. C. P. Newman, town of LaSalle, P. Q. Not yet introduced. Fruit large roundish, deep red; moderately firm; juicy, mildly subacid; quality good. Season medium early. Plant very vigorous and productive and hardy. While not as firm as No. 23, this variety should ship well.

Ohta (Wild Red Raspberry of S. Dakota x Minnesota selected from 6,000 hybrid seedling) -Orig. N. E. Hansen, Brookings, S. D. Introd. 1912. Fruit medium to large roundish, light red; moderately firm; rather acid; quality above medium. Season medium early. Plant vigor-

ous and very hardy.

Ranere (St. Regis).-Orig. in New Jersey. Fruit medium in size, poundish, bright crimson; firm; moderately juicy, mildly subacid, little distinct flavor; quality medium. Season very early to very late. Plant hard, vigorous and p.oductive. This is commonly known as St. Regis Everbearing, but it was grown for some time under the name of Ranere before being introduced by the firm of J. T. Lovett under the name of St. Regis. Most of the crop of this variety is borne in the early part of the summer, but a small proportion develops and a still smaller proportion ripens on the new canes. A wet autumn is usually favorable for late fruiting. In dry weather the fruit does not develop well. The amount of the late crop depends very much on the character of the season. Where one has plenty of room and desires raspberries in autumn this variety will usually supply them, but it is not good enough in quality to depend on

for the main crop. Ruby (seeding of Marlboro).-Orig. New York state. Fruit above medium to large, oblong, conical, bright red; firm; moderately juicy; sweet. pleasant flavor; quality good. Should make a good shipper. A strong grower. Has not yielded as well as some others.

St. Regis. See Ranere. Sarah (seedling of Shaffer).-Orig. Wm. Saunders, London, Ont. Fruit medium to large, roundish, purple red; moderately firm; juicy, sprightly subacid, rich, very good flavor; quality very good. Season late. Plant a very strong grower, hardy and moderately productive. One of the most desirable for home use, as it extends the raspberry season considerably. Although a seedling of Shaffer, this is a suckering variety.

Sir John (seedling of Biggar seedling).-Orig. Wm. Saunders, London, roundish, bright, red; drupes large; rather soft, breaking easily; subacid. pleasant flavor; quality good. Season early. Plant a strong grower, hardy and productive. While this is for shipping, it is an early, productive variety of good quality for home

Sunbeam (seeding of Native Red Raspberry, one of several thousand seedlings)—Orig. Prof. N. E. Hansen. large, roundish, medium to dark red; moderately firm to rather solf; juicy, briskly subacid, aromatic; quality medium to good. Season early. Plant a strong grower, very hardy, productive. Useful for the prairies as it succeeds without protection.

Superlative.-Orig. Mr. Merryfield, Waldershare Gardens, Dover, England, about 1877. Introd. Bunyard & Co., Maidstone, Kent, 188. 'Fruit large to very large, conical, deep red somewhat unattractive, rather soft; quality good. Season medium early. Bush very vigorous and very productive where it succeeds well, but it is too tender in Canada except for the mildest parts. Does well in the

coast climate of British Columbia. Turner (probably a chance wild seedling).—Orig. Prof. J. B. Turner, Jacksonville, Ill., about 1835. Fruit medium to below medium in size, conical, deep red; soft, juicy, subacid, good flavor; quality good. Season early. Plant a very strong grower, very hardy and moderately productive. This variety was useful for Prairie Provinces as it could be grown without protection. but it is being displaced by Sunbeam. which is a larger fruited variety.

# 1000 Eggs in Every Hen
