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

## **Mothers' Pensions**

Latest reports from the mothers' pention commission show that circulars have been sent out to all the local boards requesting information as to the cost of living In their districts, the idea, being to revise the present manner of a flat rate distribution, a comfortable rate to be provided in accordance with the district.

There are 90 local boards in operation with about 454 members, who serve without pay. All the women are over 30 years of age, and many are qualified narses. There were over 200 applications for the position of secretary and 300; for the 14 supervisors' positions. At present there are about 500 families receiving the pension and it is estimated that the number will rise to 1000 with an annual pay roll of something like \$600,000. Reconstruction of homes and care for the health of the children are an important part of the work.

At present payments are as follows:-For mother and two children, \$40 per month; mother and three children, \$45: day evening. Those present spent an mother and four children, 50; mother and five children, \$55. These are the rates for the urban centres. In the country districts these rates are reduced by \$10 a month.
