Dunnville, July 3.—Two persons were killed and a third seriously injured this afternoon when a party of six in an automobile were struck by a Grand Trunk train at the Inman road crossing, about four miles east of Dunnville.

Mrs. George Frederick Smith and Daniel Desmude, of Moulton Township, died a few minutes after the accident through injuries received, and Fred Brunt, a boy about nine years of age, sustained a fractured skull and other serious injuries.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brunt and Mrs. Smith were injured but not seriously.
