A severe storm passed over Onondaga township on Sunday and left a trail of ruin behind it, particularly in the southern part, that means severe loss to the farmers of that section. There was a veritable cloud burst and a very heavy hailstorm, the stones being as large as eggs. Severe damage was done to the crops.

Caledonia has not lost a game this season, and this game promises to be a close contest as Jarvis will endeavor to hand them their only defeat of the season. Mr. Hawes, Engineer of the Provincial Highway Department, Toronto, inspected, on June 28, 22 miles of roads graded in Townsend under Superintendent Hamby. The Inspector was very pleased with the work and complimented the Council on having such an efficient superintendent. It is expected over 60 miles of roads will be graded by fall. **OBITUARY**

**MRS. JACOB PARK**

The remains of the late Mrs. Jacob Park, who died in Detroit on Tuesday of last week, were brought here on Thursday and interred in the Methodist cemetery. The burial service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Smitherman. The late Mrs. Park had been ailing for the past year and had been confined to her bed about 13 weeks previous to her death, suffering from cancer of the liver, which ultimately resulted in her death. Deceased was in her 70th year. Mr. and Mrs. Park and family were residents of Jarvis for a great many years, but have made their home in Detroit for several years. Besides her husband she leaves to mourn her loss two sons and three daughters, viz.:—Frank, Cleveland, Ohio; Ralph, Detroit, Mich.; Blanch (Mrs. B. LePan), Detroit; Zella (Mrs. A. Cross), Simcoe and Leah (Mrs. McDowell), Collingwood, all of whom, except Mrs. LePan, attended the funeral. The late Mrs. Park was well and favorably known here and the bereaved family have the heartfelt sympathy of a large circle of relatives and friends in their loss of a kind and loving wife and mother.

**THOMAS PARKINSON**

The very sudden death of Thomas Parkinson, of Hagersville, came as a shock to his many relatives and friends. On Thursday morning last he left his home in Hagersville, apparently in his usual good health, to go to the farm near Garnet to help his sons with the hay. While driving the car he was taken with a severe pain around the heart and on arriving at the farm he collapsed. Drs. Leatherdale and Jacques were summoned and in spite of medical skill he passed away about two o'clock Friday morning, heart trouble being the cause. Deceased was in his 56th year. He had lived at Garnet nearly all his life. About three years ago he took up his residence in Hagersville, leaving his two sons in charge of the farm. Besides his widow, he leaves four sons and two daughters, viz.: Charles and Guy, on the homestead; William, of Walpole; Clair, of Toronto; and Andrew, of Hagersville. Mrs. Stephen Smith, Brantford.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon from the home of his sons and was one of the largest ever held in this section. After a short service at the house the cortege proceeded to the Methodist church, Hagersville, thence to Hagersville cemetery for burial, the services being conducted by the Rev. E. S. Moyer. The pall-bearers were Messrs. D. N. Almas, John Dixon, Orville Beckerson, David Phillips, George Dales and Wm. McMurchy.

**MISS CHARLOTTE FORSTER**

The death of Miss Charlotte Forster occurred at an early hour last Friday morning at the home of Mr. Robt. B. Brock, in Townsend, after a brief illness, although she had been in failing health for some time.

Deceased was 80 years of age and was a daughter of the late Geo. E. Forster, who was one of the early settlers in Townsend, having come from England over eighty-five years ago and settled on the farm now owned by Mr. Brock where he spent the remainder of his days. Of a family of two sons and five daughters the subject of this sketch was the last surviving member, her sisters and brothers having predeceased during the last few years. Miss Forster was of a very kindly disposition and spent the greater part of her life in caring for others.

The funeral took place on Monday morning to St. Mary's church, Simcoe, where Rev. Father Forster, London, a nephew of deceased, conducted Mass, after which the remains were taken to the R. C. cemetery for burial, Rev. Father Nagel officiating at the grave. Six great nephews of deceased were the pall-bearers. A large concourse of relatives and friends followed the remains to their last resting place.

**JARVIS WINS AGAIN**

Defeated Hagersville Last Week by 10 to 3.

Jarvis added another game to their string of victories this season by defeating Hagersville here last Thursday in a Haldimand League fixture by 10 to 3. Jarvis started the scoring in the first innings when Walker crossed the pan. Burwash made the circuit in the second, and in the fourth Mason, Cox and Burwash scored. In the fifth Head replaced Millenbacher on the firing line but the result was the same, Mason, Cox and Burwash again scoring. Church added one in the sixth and Steel another in the eighth, making the total 10. Wagner was on the firing line for Jarvis and pitched great ball, holding the Hagersville nine scoreless for the first seven innings and it looked like a shut-out, but he weakened slightly in the eighth and Hagersville tallied three, their only runs of the game. Walker pitched the ninth. The first two batters up reached first safely, but the next two fanned and the side was retired by a good peg by Horne from centre, catching the runner at the plate. Rev. Mr. Duncan, from Saskatchewan, who is visiting here, kindly consented to umpire the game and his work was of the highest order, and was ably assisted on bases by Mr. Waterbury of Selkirk. The local team played one of their best games, not an error being charged against them. It is only now that the boys are rounding into shape, being handicapped in the early part of the season by not having grounds to practice on.
