The authorities believe local boys are responsible for the theft, the same store being broken into three months ago, when similar articles were taken.

In the ball game at Dunnville last week Wagner, for Jarvis, pitched a beautiful game for light innings, allowing only four hits, but in the ninth a few lucky hits netted Dunnville four runs, just enough to win. Wagner whiffed fourteen. The Chronicle says: "It was a hard game for Jarvis to lose, but a sweet victory for the locals." Truly lucky.

Caledonia, Dunnville, Hagersville and Cayuga took part, and the handsome Orme trophy, held for some years by Dunnville was won by Caledonia. The soft ball game between the high schools of Caledonia and Hagersville did not take place, not sufficient being in attendance.

## Beneficial Effects of School Fairs

School fairs are to the boys and girls of the land what the larger fairs are to adults. By this time they should be thoroughly organized, prize lists published and circulated and programmes of proceedings prepared, the two indeed given in one publication. These fairs increase in number every year and are proving of estimable value in the agricultural education of the young and even in beneficially influencing the mere mature. Of course boys' and girls' clubs are the principal feeders of the fairs, but entries are usually accepted from children who are not members of any such organization. Agricultural Representatives all testify to the splendid effect the fairs are having upon farm life and agricultural pursuits generally. One, for instance, writes: "I do not know of any one thing which is a greater factor in improving the farm production and the farm industry of the country than the school fairs."

In addition to bringing direct, practical results, school fairs have had a very effective influence in encouraging teachers to take up the teaching of agriculture in the public schools. Another says: "The importance of the school fairs cannot be over-emphasized. It teaches our future farmers how they can take the most out of the soil. It makes our rural people better and happier." In recognition of the truth of the old adage, "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy," a programme of sports is usually included in the day's list of proceedings.

## Barn Burned

The origin of the fire is unknown. We understand there was an insurance of \$900 on barn and \$700 on contents in the Walpole Farmers' Mutual.

## Killed by Lightning

A fatal accident occurred last Thursday when Gordon Kett, a farmer residing near Dufferin, was struck by lightning and instantly killed. The deceased was taking a load of hay to market and was near the Gore, about three miles north of Nelles Corners when the fatality occurred. His brother, who followed a short distance on another load, sustained no injuries. Deceased was in his 29th year and leaves a widow and four small children.

Frank Nelles, of Caledonia, died at the Hamilton City Hospital on Tuesday morning, aged 47 years. The funeral will take place in Caledonia on Thursday afternoon.
