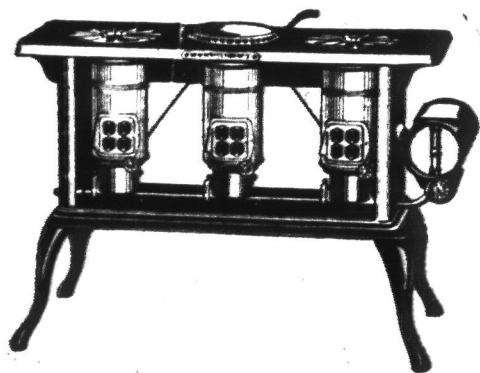

ELECTRIFICATION.

Europeans Are Now Discovering the Value of Power.

Interest in electrification is not confined to America, but is general in European countries. Confronted with an alarming scarcity of coal, the different nations have been obliged to consider the subject seriously.

Recently a French mission visited this country with the object of reporting what progress had been made here in the matter and of examining the means and methods employed, with a view to their adoption in France.

Switzerland has a very ambitious program. The authorities are planning to electrify all the Government-owned lines in the country, spreading the work over a period of twenty years.

Switzerland is particularly favored because of the great potential power in its mountain streams and torrents, and to plans outlined show that its business heads are alive to the possibilities.

Italy, which is almost totally dependent on outside sources for its coal, realizes the necessity of conserving its fuel supply, and is proceeding with plans for the electrification of its roads. According to recent advances, Lenin is advocating the electrification of all the railroads of Russia and urging the fullest utilization of its water power resources.

Brazil is at present electrifying a portion of its steam roads for a distance of 28 miles, with a total of 75 miles of track, so that it is evident that the trend toward electrification is world wide, a fact that confirms the claims of superiority made for it.

In so far as the scrapping of equipment is concerned the extent of it and the resultant loss would be very slight. Electrification is a process that cannot be performed in a day—it must be done gradually.

As one portion of the line is electrified the steam locomotives can be used on the other divisions, and, as all new equipment ordered would be electrical, by the time the road would be wholly electrified the steam equipment would have become increasingly smaller through wear or usage. It may be correctly stated that the loss from obsolescence would be so small as to be negligible.

Believing Is Seeing.

One of P. T. Barnum's rules for success in business was, "Let your pledged word be ever sacred. Nothing is more valuable to a man in business than the name of always doing as he agrees." An honest effort to live up to this led to an amusing incident in Baltimore.

Barnum's daughter Caroline went with him on his famous trip with Jenny Lind and helped many times to divert attention from the Swedish nightingale when the crowd became too pressing simply by putting on one of Jenny's bonnets and fighting her way through crowds on her father's arm.

This time, however, the people deceived themselves. "We were at Baltimore on the Sabbath," says Mr. Barnum, "and my daughter accompanied a friend to church, took a seat with her in the choir and joined in the singing. A number of the congregation who had seen Caroline with me and supposed her to be Jenny Lind were still laboring under the mistake, and it was whispered through the church that Jenny Lind was in the choir. The excitement was worked to its highest pitch when my daughter rose as one of the musical group. Every ear was on the alert to catch the first notes of her voice, and when the notes gushed forth glances of satisfaction passed through the assembly. Caroline, quite unconscious of the attention she attracted, continued to sing to the end of the hymn. Not a note was lost upon the ears of the attentive congregation.

"What an exquisite singer!" I never heard the like!" and similar expressions were whispered through the church. The pith of the joke was that my daughter had no extraordinary ability as a vocalist."
