W. E. Hare, Acting Against
W. E. Hare Making Ready

J. L. Counsell, acting for David Has-
tings, formerly magistrate of Dunville,
announces that statement of claim in
the action against Attorney-General
Raney, arising out of the charges made
against Mr. Hastings in connection with
the administration of the O.T.A. in
Dunville, has been prepared. Mr.
Counsell said the case would be heard
sometime in October, and while there
was a possibility that it might be held
in Hamilton, it was more likely to be
heard in Cayuga.

Pt. Dover's New Bridge

The bascule and trunnion bridge across
Black Creek, at the head of the harbor,
Port Dover, which has been under con-
struction for the past eight months, and
was recently completed, was formally
opened last Thursday.

The bridge just erected has a move-
ment span of 55 feet, upon which is a
roadway 15 feet wide and a sidewalk six
feet wide. The chamber for the counter
weight is 22 feet, and the counter weight
weighs 84½ tons. Length of bridge over
all, 76 feet 11 inches; distance from main
trunnion to outer end, 66 feet 5 inches;
width of bridge over all, 22 feet; total
weight of steel approximately 125 tons;
total resisting moment, approximately
2,340,000 foot pounds. The bridge opens
to an angle of 20 degrees, 30 minutes.

This is a Strauss bascule bridge, the
plans for which were furnished by the
Strauss Bascule Bridge Company, of
Chicago.

Boy Scouts at Woodlawn

Woodlawn Park, near Nanticoke, is the
scene of many happy picnics these days,
when visitors from all the surrounding
countryside motor over to see the Boy
Scouts' camp which is located there. The
camp, under the command of Scoutmaster
Frank C. Anders, is in excellent condition
and is now composed of the second con-
tingent of 150 boys from Hamilton. Dur-
ing the day the boys drill, go on long
hikes, swim, eat ice cream cones and line
up for meals to the sound of the camp
bugle and incidentally collect such a con-
tingent of tan that new comers are easily dis-
tinguishable. In the evening the shore is a
picture as the bonfire blazes merrily and
the light glows on the faces of the boys,
and many visitors group about the bank
watching the war dances, laughing at the
jokes and listening to the comic songs
and the lilts of the mouth organ. On Sun-
day relatives of the boys come out and
the Scouts usually have their own service
on the grounds, but on July 31st they will
parade for Divine service to the An-
glican church at Nanticoke at 11 o'clock,
where the Rev. Mr. Brand will officiate.

**Caledonia Wins Last League
Game on Local Diamond.**

Jarvis wound up their Haldimand Co.
League games here last Thursday when
Caledonia, the league leaders, again put
it over the locals by the close score of 4-2.
It was confidently predicted that Jarvis
would at least take one game from the
leaders, but the best they could do was
to give them the hardest battles that
Caledonia has had during the league
season, the home team losing the first
game at Caledonia 3-2. The game here
last week was a pitcher's battle, in which
Brown for Caledonia had slightly the
edge, allowing only four hits and having
nine strike outs, while Wagner for the
locals was a close second, with six hits
and eight strike outs. The visitors scored
first in the third innings on a couple of
errors. Two more were added in the
fifth after two were out on a two-bagger
by Moyer, followed by singles by Shaw
and Brown. Singles by Brown and Todd
in the eighth gave them their last tally.
Jarvis did not secure a hit until the 6th,
when Wagner and Cox hit safely, but no
runs were scored. The 7th opened bright,
Mason got free transportation, Ineson
reached first on an error, Barwash whiffed,
Church grounded to Hibbard who made a
bad peg to first, Mason and Ineson scor-
ing. Horn fanned and Wagner hit safely,
Church losing the opportunity to score.
Cox fanned and the side was retired.
There was a big attendance at the game,
a great many coming from Caledonia ex-
pecting to see a close game and they were
not disappointed. It was a nice game,
the umpiring was satisfactory and there
was no kicking whatever. The collection
