DAVID HASTINGS SUES FOR \$50,000

Dunnville Man Starts Action Against Hon. W. E. Raney

Hamilton, May 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—Legal proceedings, which were threatened on behalf of David Hastings, of Dunnville, suspended police magistrate, against Attorney General Raney, at the time of the investigation of Hastings' administration of the O. T. A., were started to-day when a writ was issued by Walter Robb, of Cayuga, against Mr. Raney for \$50,000 damages.

The action is the outcome of charges which Hastings states were made against him by the attorney-general, when a Dunnville deputation waited upon the attorney-general and asked for Hastings' reinstatement as magistrate. The alleged charges were not on the list furnished to Commissioner Patterson in connection with the investigation.

Mr. Patterson's report was handed to the Government just before the prorogation of the last session of the Legislature. In it was a recommendation that Mr. Hastings be asked for his resignation. The resignation has not been forthcoming and, as far as it is known, it has not yet been asked for.

What Enumerators Will Want to Know.

On Wednesday, June 1, enumerators employed in taking the local census for Dominion statistics, will start their canvass of the County of Haldimand. The enumerators will be required to take an oath of secrecy regarding information obtained, so that the public may have no fear in answering the prescribed questions. All enumerators will carry credentials, and the forms filled in at each home, if correct, will be forwarded to Ottawa as strictly confidential.

Only total figures resulting from the particular information obtained from each home will be published or divulged. There are 34 questions to be answered by every person in Canada, including inmates of jails, penitentiaries, and other Government institutions at the time.

Following are the questions on the prescribed form which will be filled in at every home in the county;

1. Names of each person in the house, street, town.
2. Is house owned or rented?
3. If rented, what rent?
4. Class of house.
5. Materials of construction.
6. Rooms occupied by family.
7. Relationship to head of family.
8. Sex.
9. Single or married.
10. Age last birthday.
11. Where person was born.
12. Where father was born.
13. Where mother was born.
14. If born outside of Canada, give year of immigration.
15. If born a foreigner give year of naturalization.
16. Nationality.
17. Racial or tribal origin.
18. Can speak English.
19. Can speak French.
20. Can speak any other language.
21. Religious denomination.
22. Can read.
23. Can write.
24. Months at school since September 1920 (children).
25. Chief occupation or trade.
26. Employer, or employee working on own account.
27. Total earnings in past 12 months.
28. If out of work on June 1, 1921.
29. Number of weeks employed in past twelve months.
30. Number of weeks unemployed from June 1, 1920, because of illness.

"That Edith Sovereign came to her death from injuries sustained by being struck by a motor car on the evening of May 19, 1921, on Main street, Lucan, said car being driven by James Ward, of Lucan, and from the evidence submitted we are agreed that the accident could not have been avoided and that the driver of said car, James Ward, was in no way to blame for the accident."

Chief Elliott Dead

Outstanding Figure Among Canadian Indians.

Brantford, May 30.—One of the outstanding figures among the Six Nations Indians passed away on the reserve in the person of Chief J. W. M. Elliott. He was a first cousin of E. Pauline Johnson, Indian poetess, and claimed on his father's side to be descendant from the Elliots which furnished the Minto family.

After a course at the O. A. C., Guelph, he became a reporter for The Toronto Mail before it absorbed The Empire. Later he was on the staff of the department of Indian affairs at Ottawa. His mature manhood he spent on the reserve near Ohsweken, becoming a color sergeant of the 37th Haldimand rifles, with which he served for 36 years. He was an eloquent speaker in both English and Mohawk and took a leading part in many important conferences. His work on the address to returned soldiers being quoted by the Dominion archives as the best example of Indian eloquence. His hobbies were agriculture and botany, he having a passion for flowers.

The remains were interred yesterday at Ohsweken with military honors. The funeral was the largest ever held on the reserve.

Death followed a fall from a buggy, which resulted in lockjaw.
