### INDIANS SENTENCED

#### Sherry and Henry Plead Guilty at Simcoe

Simcoe, May 27.—For assaulting with intent to rob, while armed, Hilton George Sherry and Elmer Henry, two Tuscarora Indians, were tried before Judge Boles to-day. They pleaded guilty and were sentenced to Portsmouth penitentiary. Sherry for eight years and Henry for six years.

The Indians had attempted to rob Joseph Howard, merchant, of Hartford Village, on the border of the reserve, but Howard when attacked in his stable by night, gave battle, was shot in the shoulder, but got the revolver and the caps and masks of the men.

In giving sentence his honor told the prisoners that he had fully considered their youth, each about 25 years old, their war service and their nationality, but was bound to give sufficient sentence to give the men time to adjust their
