Post office officials point out that postage stamps are not to be used for making remittances, that is, they are not to be sent in quantity to mail order firms in payment for goods or to business houses in payment of accounts, etc., as this is contrary to post office regulations. It is pointed out that postal notes for 20c, 25c, 30c, 40c, etc. up to \$10 can be readily obtained at money order and postal note offices, and their use for remitting small amounts is strongly recommended as being especially convenient for the sender and for the person receiving the amount.

Railroad, then later as fireman, our worthy townsman became a "full fledged" engineer in '89, in the good old days when wood was used to fire the locomotives. Bishop Clark in Jarvis

On Wednesday last, Bishop Clark visited St. Paul's Church on the occasion of a Service of Confirmation. There was a good attendance. The Church was beautifully decorated with vases of white flowers, bowls of flowers also being placed on either side the chancel steps. Four candidates were presented by the Rector to receive the rite. His Lordship in the course of his address said that Confirmation was not an end in itself but merely the first step into a life of Christian fellowship and service. A life which could not be maintained save by regular habits and prayer, Bible Study, Worship and Holy Communion and pointed out that in every case where those confirmed went back instead of forward, it was due to neglect of one or more of these aids to living the Christian life. The Bishop especially mentioned the danger resulting from the present day practise of regarding the Sunday, as a day to be spent in amusement and pleasure instead of a day ordained by God to be kept holy, when He might be worshiped and glorified and His people might enjoy fellowship with one another. He laid stress on Service as being the necessary accompaniment of all healthy Church life. Service which might be of the most varied character but which must in some form have a part in the life of every true member of Christ's Church.
At the close of the service the Bishop, who with Mrs. Clark spent the night at the Rectory, held an informal reception and received the greetings of many old friends, who rejoiced that his Lordship appeared considerably stronger than for some time past.

TIED FOR SECOND PLACE
Jarvis Won From the Rainham Centre Team 6 to 5.

Just as we predicted last week—a keen interesting contest—was the baseball game played here on Saturday between Rainham Centre and Jarvis teams of the Haldimand County League. It was full of thrills from start to finish, and the large crowd present had the pleasure of witnessing one of the most interesting, hair-raising, noisy ball games played here in many a day—not since the memorable battles between Windham Centre and Jarvis some years ago, when Jarvis won from that strong team by the same score 6 to 5, and likewise putting over the winning run in their last half of the ninth inning. The Rainham Centre team was accompanied by a large crowd of rooters—and they certainly were noisy rooters—who had apparently come specially to see their team give Jarvis an awful drubbing. They came with a clean sheet with two straight wins to their credit, having won from Cayuga and Dunnville, and apparently Jarvis was figured to be their third "easy" victim. But they struck a snag, and when the game was over the score showed Jarvis a 6 to 5 winner with only one down in the ninth.

An unfortunate accident occurred in the second innings which somewhat marred the local team's chances of winning, when Walker at bat received a nasty crack on the chin from a foul tip off his bat. His injuries were attended to by Dr. Leatherdale and he pluckily continued in the game. This had a bad effect on his playing and prevented him from going into the pitching box. Wagner started in the box and gamely held on to the end. He twirled his usual good game but weakened considerably toward the finish, as he is not yet fit to go the full route owing to lack of training.
Rainham Centre seems to have a well-balanced team of good batters and fielders. Wedrick did the pitching for the visitors up the 8th inning when he was replaced by Culver, and their work in the box was of a good sort.
Rev. A. W. Hare umpired the game impartially and his decisions gave general satisfaction.
