The Wool Situation

The past week has seen the bulk of Haldimand County's 1921 wool clip forwarded to Guelph, there to be graded and sold through the medium of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers' Association. Some 17,000 pounds of wool were shipped from this county to be marketed in this manner. Reports indicate that a larger per cent of this year's clip is being worked up at home, owing to the comparatively low level of prices as compared with last year and also to the low prices being quoted by local buyers. Very little buying has been effected to date, growers considering local bids hardly worth accepting.

The marketing organization of the wool growers quote the following prices for sales that have already been effected:—Fine Medium staple, 25c; Medium Staple, 25c; Medium Staple, 21c to 23c; Low Medium Staple, 20c to 22c; Low Staple, 14c to 16c; Coarse Staple, 12c to 14c.

Mrs. R. A. Dougherty

It is our sad duty this week to chronicle the death of Jane Horn, wife of Mr. Robert Dougherty, of Woodhouse, whose death occurred at the Hamilton City Hospital on Thursday evening last.

Deceased had been in poor health for several weeks and just one week previous to her death was taken to the hospital with the hope that she would be benefited by an operation, but despite surgical skill she passed away as above stated. Mrs. Dougherty was well and favorably known, having lived in this section nearly all her life. She was a daughter of the late John Horn of Woodhouse, and was married about eight years ago. She was one of a family of six daughters and three sons, and was predeceased by two sisters. Deceased was in her 64th year.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from her late home to Knox church cemetery, and the large attendance showed the high esteem in which she was held in the community. Rev. A. W. Hare conducted the services.

Haldimand W. I.

Annual Meeting Held in the Presbyterian Church.

Was One of the Best in the History of the Institute.

"That the world would go to pieces inside of two weeks but for the people of two little islands in the North Atlantic Ocean," was the statement made by Dr. Wm. Jaques, ex-M. L. A., at the annual meeting of the Haldimand Women's Institute held in Knox Church, Jarvis, on Friday last. The statement was received with much applause. The speaker in his short but important address chose for his subject, "Altruism," "thinking for others," which he thought coincided with the motto of the W. I., "Our Home and Country," and impressed on his hearers that character was all that counted and that it was the duty, not the privilege, of the women to use the franchise for the good of country apart from any party consideration.

The meeting was one of the best in the history of the institute, which is considered the banner society of Ontario, and consists of 29 branches, with 556 members. Nineteen branches were represented. Mrs. Joseph Peart, president, conducted the meeting, and much pleasure was expressed in the presence of Mrs. (Dr.) Burns, who held the presidency for many years.

The president, Mrs. Peart, spoke on the W. I. Federation, of Canada, by which the Government meets the rural population, and which Ontario was specially included. She spoke of the breadth of the organization, which, while self governing, was assisted by the Government, but was nonpartisan and nonpolitical.

Mrs. Simpson extended a greeting to the visitors, to which Mrs. Burns replied.

Mrs. (Dr.) Berry spoke on "Basketry," which course had been taken up in Caledonia, and exhibited some beautiful articles made by the class. She thought it was up to the Government to put this course on its list of those for which instructors were provided and regretted that Mr. Putman was not present.

APPEAL FOR AID.

Mr. Hilger, of the Children's Aid work, said that at last he had a small beginning for the shelter for which they had been working for so long. Mrs. (Rev.) Eric Lewis, of Cayuga, had agreed to give a large room in her house and undertake the care of three children, yet he needed assistance in furniture and equipment, clothing, etc. The meeting pledged themselves to assist him.

In the unavoidable absence of Mr. Putman and Dr. Margaret Patterson Dr. Jaques gave his address, which was splendidly received. Mr. Springstead, agricultural representative at Cayuga, spoke on "Co-operation," referring to what had been done during the war. He urged for improved schools and the formation of school and home associations, which brought the teachers, pupils and parents in touch with each other. He urged greater interest in school fairs, in which several thousand children in Haldimand were already interested, and spoke on medical inspection in schools, which was begun in Haldimand County and then spread to Peel.

BUY CANADIAN GOODS.

The resolution committee brought in three resolutions: First, that the Government be asked to extend the courses to include basketry and other new courses; second, that a propaganda be carried on to use made in Canada goods; third, that the institute objects to being used for political purposes.

Wreck On Wabash

Passenger Train Leaves Track At Nelles Corners—Four Persons Hurt.

An accident occurred at Nelles Corners about 3.30 yesterday afternoon when the engine, baggage car and one passenger coach of the east bound Wabash passenger train left the rails. Drs. Jaques and Leatherdale were called to the scene. Pat Nevir, baggageman, of Windsor, was seriously injured and three other persons, unknown, painfully hurt and a score were more or less shaken up. The accident is thought to have been due to a spread rail. In view of the fact that the train was travelling at a moderate rate of speed what might have been a serious accident was avoided.

The train had about 37 passengers on board, mostly foreigners. One girl, whose name could not be learned, suffered painful injuries, and was taken to Hamilton. The train was in charge of Engineer Wm. K. Sanderson, of St. Thomas, (son the late John C. Sanderson of this village), and Jas. Bradley, conductor. Those in the accident state that was marvellous that several of the passengers and train crew were not seriously or fatally injured.

Officials of the Wabash, from St. Thomas, could give no reason for the accident other than a spread rail. Three auxiliaries from St. Thomas, Hamilton and Bridgeburg were dispatched to the scene of the accident and the line was cleared about midnight. The track was badly torn up.

JARVIS LOST LAST WEEK

Rainham Centre Gets Revenge, Winning 6 to 3.
